

LOCAL AND DISTANT ANTI-MORMONS.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THEM—THE FIRST KNOW THE VIRTUES OF THE SAINTS; THE OTHERS WILL NOT TAKE THE TROUBLE TO LEARN ABOUT THEM.

The wide difference between the anti-"Mormons" in and out of Utah, is that those here know that the "Mormons" deserve great praise instead of censure.

They know that the "Mormons" are a sober, industrious and virtuous people.

They know, too, that they have faith in God, and that they love Him.

They know that, as a people, the Saints are prayerful, honest and upright.

They know that their own lives and the few chattels they possess are infinitely safer in than out of Utah.

They also know that their wives and children are not exposed to one-tenth as many wicked influences and temptations in, as they would be out of Utah.

They know that if the "Mormons" were a tithe as bad and murderous as they continually charge them to be, their own lives would not be worth the heap it would take to hang them.

They know that if the "Mormons" were not very forbearing, and charitable, and peaceable, they could not villify and abuse them in every issue of their obscene papers without suffering the consequences of their unprovoked and unwarrantable malevolence.

They know that they can't sustain one of the malicious charges against the purity, honesty, probity and general good character of the Saints with unperjured testimony.

They know that if the "Mormons" fostered bands of "Thugs," "Danites" and "Destroying Angels," as they persistently allege, that they would be made to "bite the dust."

They know that the magnates of the "Mormon" Church (whom they constantly villify and outrage without interruption) hold the people back with herculean grip, lest their human nature should get the better of them and they be led to wreak vengeance on their traducers.

They know, too, that in no other community in Christendom could they establish and perpetuate their libelous, vulgar and mendacious prints, together with the brothels, saloons and gambling dens they have introduced into Utah, which, if they did not patronize and foster, would not remain long in the Territory for want of support.

They know that the "Mormons" are pre-eminently patriotic and law-abiding, and that they love their common country, respect its flag and revere its great Magna Charta—the palladium of mutual liberty and prosperity.

They also know that through their utterly reckless disregard of noon-day facts, in writing about Utah affairs, they are doing our great Territory incalculable injury.

What does the outside press know about Utah, except through the befouled and turgid streams of vituperation and falsehood circulated by the Salt Lake falsehood-breeders, the anti-"Mormon" press dispatchers and the other local champion truth-economisers?

Viewing these matters from this standpoint, the outside anti-"Mormons" are not so greatly to blame for the antagonism they manifest when discussing the "Mormon" situation. Some of them are, no doubt, in the frame of mind that Paul was in, when he held the vestments of the murderers of Stephen while they stoned him to death; and like the crucifiers of that holiest of Beings, who prayed to His Father to forgive them for they knew not what they did.

If the local clergy were honest and truthful—elements of which they seem woefully deficient—instead of adding fuel to the ungodly fire kindled against us by the local anti-"Mormon" bandits, whose abettors they are, they would be glad to certify to the good character of the "Mormons," and maintain, as they verily know, that the "Mormons" are the superiors, in every particular, of their vile traducers. But they won't do this, because they are dishonest and wicked and blood-thirsty, precisely like the scribes, Pharisees, and hypocrites of yore, who professed so much holiness and purity of character, but who were "whited sepulchre, filled with dead men's bones, and all manner of uncleanness."

Jesus did not pray for them to be forgiven, because of their presumed ignorance; but he cauterized and cursed them with all the vehemence He was in command of.

The conclusion forced upon us is, that the local anti-"Mormons" are devilish from choice and downright cursedness; those elsewhere, for the most part, because of the deceptions practiced upon them by the local crusaders.

They, however, are more or less censurable, for not sending hither truthful and upright men to obtain facts in regard to the "Mormons," their institutions, their practices, aims and objects, and not on the unconfirmed, *ex parte*, clap-trap, assertions of bitter enemies, assume that the "Mormons" are a wicked, dangerous, conspiring and disloyal element, living for the sole purpose of destroying the nation.

This constitutes the main difference between the local and outside "Mormon"-haters.
