## EVENING NEWS.

## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Immigrants.**—The Deseret Telegraph Company courteously furnishes us the following:  
The immigrants will arrive at Ogden at 5 p. m., will remain there to night and on Monday will arrive here at 11:40 a. m. to-morrow.

**Returned.**—President John Taylor and party returned from the north by this morning's express.

**From the South.**—Dan Olsen, our old time musical friend, came up from Fillmore last evening and will spend a day or two in the city. Glad to see old friends at any time.

**Thanksgiving Day.**—Thursday, November 27th, has been appointed the national day of thanksgiving for the present year. The proclamation of President Hayes will be found elsewhere.

**Destroyed by Fire.**—On Sunday, October 26th, the new house of Brother Folkman, late Bishop of Soda Springs, but now of Gentile Valley, Idaho, was burned with its contents, by accident. The loss reached \$5,000.

**Leg Broken.**—A boy named Frank Toland, of Ogden, had his leg broken on Sunday afternoon, by being caught in one of the wheels of a moving wagon, into which he was climbing. We got this from the Junction.

**Our New Organist.**—During Professor Daynes' absence in the east, Brother Henry Giles, a rising young musician, will take his place at the Tabernacle organ. Brother Giles is quite competent for the position and a worthy successor to the one who leaves.

**Home Made Saltpetre.**—Bishop A. C. Pyper showed us, yesterday morning, a fine sample of nitrate of potash, manufactured by himself, from a quantity of nitrate of lime obtained from a mine in Gentile Valley, Idaho, owned by Mr. Daniel Cullen, the postmaster at that place. The Bishop is an expert chemist, having manufactured the nitre for the fireworks used here in earlier days, and is much interested in the subject of producing saltpetre for the local manufacture of powder, and other commodities of which it is an ingredient. Heretofore, all the nitre used in experimenting or making powder, has been imported, but this is now rendered unnecessary, since there are no less than three different sources, right at hand, from which the raw material may be obtained. One is the nitre mine in Gentile Valley, having lime as its basis, another in Soda Springs, producing nitrate of soda, and still another in the mountains of Southern Utah, adjacent to St. George. As soda draws dampness, it is only the nitrate of lime that can be utilized for powder making. The material from Southern Utah is gathered from the mountain caves in sacks, the resource hardly deserving the name of a mine, and it would cost about \$1 per pound to ship it to this point. The nitre from the north can be obtained much cheaper, is of an excellent quality, and therefore superior to the imported article, and the process of converting it into saltpetre, we are assured by Bishop Pyper, is very simple.

We hope it will not be long before experts and artisans will be at work analyzing and manufacturing this valuable article for home use. Developments are constantly being made which prove that Utah is behind no region in natural resources, as various as they are vast and valuable.

**Did Not Mean to Desert.**—On Saturday evening, a soldier giving the name of Stewart, surrendered himself at the police office as a deserter from Company D, at Fort Douglas. The officers took him in for the night and sent word to the military authorities at the fort to come and get him. Sunday the sergeant of his platoon and Stewart's wife came down to interview him. On being asked by the former what induced him to desert he said he didn't intend to do so, but got on a spree Friday and while under the influence of liquor gave himself up to the police as a runaway. The sergeant said Stewart would not have been considered a deserter on such short absence, but merely have been corrected for leaving without permission. Stewart's wife gave her frugal husband a good "talking to" for doing as he had done. He might report himself a deserter, but she did not relish the idea of being known as a "deserted wife." Yesterday he was taken back to the garrison.

**Dancing Parties.**—Before us lies a neatly printed invitation to a series of six select parties, to be given every alternate Friday evening, commencing on the 7th inst., in the 17th Ward Assembly Rooms. A number of very pleasant and popular dances were given last winter by a committee of gentlemen, most of whose names are also guarantees for the excellent character of this series. A very sensible announcement is that the dances begin at 7:30 o'clock and end at 12, and that no person can bring a friend without seeing a member of the committee. The tickets being not transferable, a select attendance can be maintained. Tickets for the series, \$3.00, single evening, 50c. Clive's full quadrille band furnishes the music.

**The Hat of the Martyr.**—We were shown, this morning, the hat worn by Elder Joseph Standing at the time he was murdered. The relic was brought from Georgia by Elder Rudger Clawson, on his recent return from the Southern States, and placed in the care of Professor Barfoot, the curator of the Deseret Museum, by whom it was exhibited at our office. The hat is soiled with lime and blood, bears the marks of the assassin's bullets, and is crushed and battered, evidently having been preserved in the condition in which it was found. It is a sad but interesting relic, and will be placed side by side with the mementos of the prophets murdered at Carthage.

**Detained by Sickness.**—Mrs. L. Careless, who has been spending several months in the great city of London, whither she went to take a course in musical training, will not arrive, as expected, with the company this evening. She writes to her husband that she is suffering from rheumatism, and that it would be impossible for her to come home until Spring, as her physicians had advised her that if she left earlier it would be at a serious risk of health. We regret that such is the case, and trust the lady will soon recover and return in safety to her home and friends.

**Finish the Canals.**—One of the subjects touched upon at the Primethood meeting on Saturday was the work of finishing the Jordan canals. The people were urged most strenuously to push the work through, to relieve the embarrassments that would otherwise continually recur in water matters, during the dry seasons. We hope the people will heed the wise counsel and prosecute the work with energy and dispatch.

**Given Bonds.**—The Case of John Fowler, charged with bigamy, came up this morning in the District Court. The defendant was admitted to bonds in the sum of \$2,500, and given a week's time to plead.

**Could Not Agree.**—Yesterday afternoon, the jury in the case of the People against Thos. Oney and Geo. Alford, indicted for grand larceny, were unable to agree and were therefore discharged.

**Reprehensible.**—Mr. Geo. Arbogast, with his wife and child, while coming down the hill east of the city last evening in a buggy, was upset by a rude and careless fellow driving into him with a heavy wagon. The ill-mannered boor did not even look around to see the extent of the accident. No one was seriously hurt.

**Getting Better.**—The three children of Brother R. F. Neesen, of the Eighteenth Ward, who have been seriously ailing with pneumonia and bronchitis for about two weeks, are pleased to state are improving. Two are recovering rapidly and hopes are held for the early restoration of the other.

**Unaccounted For.**—Last Friday, Dr. D. B. Lamoreaux, of Logan, on going into one of his rooms, found it on fire. There was no stove in it, and the cause is entirely unaccountable. It was extinguished without much difficulty, the damages being confined to a lot of clothing hanging on a line across the apartment.

**Twelve and a Half Pounds.**—And now it is our friend George Barton, of the 15th Ward, who is receiving the congratulations of his friends on an interesting event which took place in his family yesterday. His wife Sena presented him with the eighth child, a fine daughter weighing 12 pounds. Mother and infant are doing finely. Long life to the baby!

**CACHE VALLEY CANALS.**—Surveys are being made in Cache Valley, by Mr. James H. Martineau, civil engineer, for two extensive canals to assist in the reclaiming of the unwatered lands of that fruitful region, and the enhancing of the facilities for irrigation. The canal already surveyed is to extend from Old Paradise to Wellsville, a distance of 18 miles. It will be made six feet deep and run around the south end of Cache Valley, nearly to Sardine Springs, pass about 100 feet above Wellsville and Mendon, and run north to Bear River Gap. Thousands of choice acres will thus be watered.

The other canal will lead from Logan River along the foot of the mountains north to Smithfield, about 12 miles. It will be a large and expensive aqueduct, as about one and a half or two miles of it have been constructed along the steep, rocky sides of Logan Cañon.
