Extensive Tree and Beet Planting Anticipated.

Special Correspondence, La Grande, Or., Feb. 26.—All hands are busy plowing and otherwise pre-paring the land for seeding into such crops as are generally planted here. The fall grain looks very well, al-though not quite so far advanced at this time of the year, owing to the spring being later than common. It looks well, however, and all being well will bring a heavy yield.

COMPETITION NOT KEEN. The fact that the University of Utah is securing its equipment, and is rapidly growing in its student body, is responsi-ble for a gradual pulling away of the University from athietic competition with other state schools. It has ceased to be a matter of doubt as to who will win the track meet, and therefore the com-petition has not stirred other schools, or the University itself, into a very husky action. Logan and Provo have had a fight for place, and this was the item of largest interest in the meet last year. At that time Utah won by 20 points more than were secured by her opponents com-bined, and by 15 points more than in the previous year. Out of a possible III points the University scored 55, the Agri-cultural College 20%, the B, Y. U. of Provo 20 and the L. D. S. U. 7. FIGHT FOR SECOND PLACE.
