DISCRIMINATION DENIED BY O.S.L.

Railroad Answers Charges Made By Ogden Before Interstate Commerce Commission

DIAMONDS STOLEN ON TRAIN.

Labor Day Will be Observed as Holiday in Junction City—News Briefs.

OGDEN, Sept. 4.—A lengthy answer has been made by the attorneys of the Oregon Short Line Railroad company to the complaint of the Weber club and other citizens who have protested to the interstate commerce commission regarding discrimination in railroad rates against Ogden City and in favor of Salt Lake City. The answer has been filed with Judge H. H. Henderson of the local bar, who is representing the Ogden interests.

The document takes up each allegation of the complaint and denies the charge of discrimination as against Ogden and in favor of Salt Lake in the matter of railroad fares to attend local or state fairs. In justification for its special conference rates, the answer concludes as follows: "That, by reason of the establishment of Mormon or Latter-day Saint Church of its capital city in Salt Lake City, it has resulted in developing in that city a large population and a vast amount of business; that the said city now contains, as these defendants are informed and believe, and allege the fact to be, a population of about 100,000 people; that the next city in size to Salt Lake City in said state is Ogden, with a population, as these defendants are informed and believe, of not exceeding 20,000 people. That, as a result of the growth and development of Salt Lake City, it constitutes not only the religious center and capital of the Mormon Church, but is the capital of the state and the center of great mining, commercial, banking and other industries of the state and surrounding country. That ever since the settlement of said city the said Mormon Church, as a part of its policy and the teaching of its faith, has held in April and October of each year, at said Salt Lake City, its general semi-annual conference of the entire church, and when a large proportion of its members wherever they may be located, regularly attend. That the said policy of holding said conferences in said city was established by the said Church wholly independent of, and free from any control or influence of either of these defendants, and before either of them was organized or had an existence. That these regularly attend said conferences many thousands of people, coming from all the localities aforesaid in which the members of said church are located, so that the said gatherings of said Mormon Church, at said semi-annual conferences, are wholly distinct and exceptional from any other gatherings or assemblies within the said State of Utah, and produce a largely increased travel over the lines of railroad of these defendants over and in excess of any other gatherings whatsoever within the said State of Utah. That the facts aforesaid constitute substantially dissimilar circumstances and conditions from those existing at said Ogden city on the occasions referred to in said petition, and justify and make reasonable and lawful the rates established and now in effect in the transportation of visitors to said conferences. These defendants further allege that rates for the state fair held at Salt Lake City annually are not given or extended for any sum or rate less than that that is offered and extended to the said fair annually held at Ogden City. These defendants further allege that the State Fair Association, through its officers, habitually fix the period of their annual fair at Salt Lake City in the early part of October and at the same time of the assembling of the Latter-day Saint Church, and thus secure for persons attending such fair the same rates as are granted to all persons during the period that the reduced rate is in existence on account of said conference. That the action of said state fair is wholly independent of, and beyond the control, and has never been influenced in any manner whatsoever, by these defendants, or either of them, and that the advantages of the rate secured to the persons attending the state fair are wholly incidental to the period fixed and the assembling of the members of the said Church at their said semi-annual conference in Ogden City. These defendants further allege that the fact that reduced rates are introduced for a limited period to and from Salt Lake City on account of the said semi-annual conference of the said church does not impose upon it any obligation to establish or introduce special, low, temporary rates for gatherings such as the four-state fair, or other assemblies at other points, and that the refusal of these defendants, or either of them, to grant similar rates, or any reduced fare whatever, to such other assemblies, these defendants, or either of them, to grant similar rates, or any reduced fare whatever, to such other assemblies is not in violation of any of the provisions of the interstate commerce act, or any other law.

MURRAY COUNCIL AND OTHER NEWS BRIEFS.

MURRAY, Sept. 4.—At the session of the city council this week the board of health submitted a report, declaring the city garbage grounds in an unsanitary condition and recommended its betterment. The city marshal was authorized to hire a man to put the grounds in a clean and sanitary condition.

The street committee recommended that the grade on Poplar street be lowered one foot. Report adopted. The same committee also recommended that Bonnell & Sons company be permitted to place poles for power purposes on the south side of Murray street between the power plant and their mill. The marshal was authorized to have notices posted in conspicuous places, prohibiting the riding of bicycles on sidewalks within the paved districts of Murray City.

The recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of cement street crossings.

SHAW'S BARN, PARADISE, DESTROYED BY FIRE.

(Special Correspondence.)

PARADISE, Utah, Aug. 31.—Last night about 7:30 a fire broke out in a barn belonging to Harry A. Shaw. An alarm was raised and people carrying buckets were soon hastening to the scene. By heroic measures horses, cows and a valuable jack were gotten out of the stable and yards, but one little calf perished in the flames.

The barn, which was 40x20x18 feet, was occupied by a stable and a small separating room. The rest of the space was filled with hay to its utmost capacity. A cream separator, sawy plow, harness and some tools were destroyed in the flames; also a stack of grain near by. By strenuous efforts the fire was kept from spreading to other valuable property near by. The loss is estimated at \$800. There was insurance on the barn for \$250. The cause of the fire is shrouded in mystery. About midnight a gentle and copious rain fell for several hours thereby helping to dampen the embers and saturate the wooden roofs of buildings in the vicinity of the fire.

With harvesting, threshing, and other work the farmers have been very busy, and it is almost impossible to get hands enough to do the threshing and plowing. The Telluride Power company has employed quite a number of our men in digging holes, hauling poles, and making roads between here and Weber county, Cache county and the towns in the south end of Cache, also some from other counties, are working with the Telluride company to construct a good wagon road to Weber county.
