## INDUSTRIAL MONOPOLIES. A Good Way to Use Them as Well as to Solve a Problem of Today.

Tax the "trusts" to pay old-age pensions, suggests Hon. John C. Chase, mayor of Haverhill, Massachusetts, in an article on the subject in the Novem-

ber "New Lippincott," Land monopoly is not what we are suffering under so much as industrial monopolles. We do not suffer from a suffering under so much as industrial monopolles. We do not suffer from a system of land monopoly so much as we do through the gigantic combina-tions of capital in industrial enter-prises. These combinations are con-stantly growing more powerful. They are in a position to levy a tax on the people at will and force them to pay. My method would be to levy a tax on them for the support of the aged and helpless. Whenever a combination is perfected and organized into a trust or monopoly for the purpose of conor monopoly for the purpose of con-trolling any industrial enterprise, a large number of persons are thrown out of employment, and, secondly, the

profits of the enterprise, which formerly went to many persons, are concentrated in the hands of a few individuals, and I say that these two facts alone are enough to convince us that the trusts should provide for those whom they rob of employment. The most feasi-ble plan, threfore, that I could suggest. would be this: Each State to create an "Old-Age Pension Commission." whose duty it would be to ascertain the number of laborers above the age of say fifty-five, and disburse among them the amount due them each month

or each quarter, as a pension in part payment for services rendered, the State to raise the funds by an annual 'tax on all corporations and industrial combinations. This is a crude outline of a pian which, of course, could be improved upon, but one which will improved upon, but one which will serve as a means of showing the lines along which the plan could be carried out.

----SPRING ONIONS.

Pacific.

Onlons, unless they have been properly prepared, are difficult to keep, but properly ripened off, dug at the right season and dried, as they should be, they will keep well. The tempera-ture must be low, and the air dry, as in a warm moist atmosphere they soon grow and are spoiled. If I had onions to store, not knowing how they had been dried. I should subject them to 100 degrees heat for several days, which has almost the effect of kin drying. Then place in shallow, slated boxes, uiled one above another, in a cellar well piled one above another, in a cellar well ventilated and kept just above freezing. If this way is not practicable they can If this way is not practicable they can be kept in a building away from fire, stored in a bin which has a thick lin-ing and covering of chaff and fine hay. They may freeze solid and thick cov-ering will keep them so until almost spring; they can be used as needed, thawing them out in cold water. Freez-ing does not injure them as long as they do not freeze and thaw repeatedly. they do not freeze and thaw repeatedly. -Vick's Magazine for November,

## SMUGGLING DOGS.

Taught to Evade the Customs Authorities by a Simple Process.

As long as customs laws exist so long will the training of animals to break them go on, for a large percentage of the smuggling cases brought to light today have quadrupeds and blpeds in

connection with them. Many people residing on the French and Italian frontiers make a living sole-ly by training dogs to carry contraband merchandise across the border The training is carried out on very much the same lies as that which the war dogs now employed in many of war dogs now employed in many of the continental armies have to under-go; that is to say, the caaine pupil is taught to defraud the customs through being beaten by men dressed in the garb of a revenue officer. From all places and corners the faked official emerges upon the dog, and thrashes it brutally until it learns to dodge any one in the uniform with all the ability one in the uniform with all the ability of a human being.

When properly trained the dog, which is generally of the collie breed, will bring a heavy price, and considering the amount of illegitimate money it will eventually be instrumental in put ting into its employer's pocket, this is only natural. Lace and slik are the chief articles curried, and are concealed in little packages fastened below the beast's stomach by muans of a strap during its journey across the frontier, -If the dog fails into the hands of the custom officials there is no clew as to whom it beiongs, so that the real of-fenders often go unpunished. That no small amount of smugaling is done in this way is proved by the fact that last year several million france' worth of articles upon which duty should have been paid found their way into the market untaxed, and over 500 sinuggling dogs were caught by the officials
