Yankee Con. Leads the List With Sales at \$4.38.

Inventor F. W. Wood of San Francisco Discusses Its Features.

THE NEW MILL

MAY DAY MUCH STRONGER. A LULL IN CALIFORNIA OIL.

Lower Mammoth Stiffens Up-Sacramento Firmer-Ajax Climbing -Century Weak.

Business was very active on the mining exchange and a new record was made by Yankee Con. Several other stocks were also much stronger, but none of them compared with Yankee Con., which sold up to \$4.38. The first sale was made at \$4.10, as compared with \$3.67 at the afternoon call yesterday. A violent spurt took place in the evening, when it was reported that \$4.30 was bid for the stock. Ajax opened at \$1.24% and sold up to \$1.35, though it weakened to \$1.33% on the closing. Lower Mammoth was traded in up to \$4.30, while May Day was traded in from 89 as high as $94\frac{1}{2}$. Sacramento was also a little stronger, selling from 351/4 to 36%. Star Con. recorded its first sale at 41%, but it afterwards climbed to 44%. Grand Central was an offering at \$5.00, while Century of Park Valley was offered at \$2.06, with \$1.90 bid. Tesora dropped 100 at 74. Joe Bowers was traded in at 4%. Silver Shield was active at 3. Northern Light participat-ed at 7%. Martha Washington was traded in at 3, and West Morning Glory loosened up a small lot at 3. Closing quotations were posted as follows:

G. G. Hall Talks of the Cost of Oil Prospects Salt Laker Goes to

Dawson-Mining Notes,

F W. Wood, Inventor of the process of dry concentration, used by the Crown Gold Milling company, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon from the coast. In a conversation with a "News" reporter today Mr. Wood expressed the greatest confidence in the success of the venture. The mill at the May Day mine is now equipped with the exception of a few minor parts which are expected to reach the mine before the end of the week. The plant has already cost over \$50,000, which has been borne by A. J. Harrell, president of the company. Mr. Wood says he expended about \$40,000 in the perfecting of the process so that he could sell it to capitalists. It was then bought by the Crown company, of which Mr. Wood remains a director. The company will not sell any of its rights, but it is willing to sell agencies in different states. Hence it happens that the agency for Utah is in the hands of A. J. Harrell, who is building the May Day mill, and who has leased it to Messrs Mosby and Flindt at a certain royalty while he in turn pays a certain royalty to the Crown company of which he

is president Mr. Wood's visit at this time is for the purpose of starting up the mill. Some experimenting will be done at the outset to determine the character of the ore. It will be necessary to also determine the point at which the most profitable extraction can be made. Mr. Wood hopes to be able to effect a fine saving without crushing the ore finer than 20 or 25 mesh. Mr. Wood explains that in the process he gives special attention to crushing so as to avoid the fine dust that causes slimes. The ore is to be passed through the rolls at a certain pace and cracked instead of being pulverized. Two sets of rolls will be operated for eight hours. which will give enough ore to keep the concentrator going for 24 hours. By this means Mr. Wood expects to secure a saving in labor, lighting, etc. Mr. Wood is confident that his machine will do all that is claimed for it and particulars as to the extraction and

RESERVATION POLICE REGULA-TIONS.

To those readers who are not acquainted with Pocatello and its sur-roundings by the Fort Hall Indian reservation, it will be interesting to know outside of the city limits, must have a special permit from the Indian Agent, which he can get for the asking, however. Wee to the lone fisherman or hunter who cannot show a pass to the challenging Indian police, who will either confiscate the name, or take the tresspasser to Ross Fort trading post to explain himself to the agent. Every week wagon loads of fishermen seek the "bottoms," the famous home of the trout. Last Sunday by accident, white men burned some haystacks on spring creek belonging to Indian farmers, and a veto on permits was apprehended and threatened and consternation was pronounced among the sports, but a compromise was effected, the hay will be paid for and the boys will be more careful about fires in the future.
