

ANGLO-RUSSIAN AGREEMENT

It is Reported on Reliable Authority That it Divides Persia into Two Sections.

SPHERES OF INFLUENCE SAME

Benefit to Result Will be the Building of a Railroad Along the Persian Gulf.

Tokyo, Sept. 2.—It is reported here on reliable authority that the new Anglo-Russian agreement divides Persia into two sections, but the respective spheres of influence of the two nations remain unchanged. Afghanistan and the southern division of Persia naturally in the British sphere. The benefit to result from the agreement will be the building of a railroad along the Persian gulf. The status quo to be maintained in Afghanistan is not that which existed prior to the Russo-Japanese war, but the condition which followed it.

LETTER CARRIERS.

Sixteenth Annual Session of Association Convened in Canton, O.

Canton, O., Sept. 2.—The National Association of Letter Carriers convened here today in the sixteenth annual session. All sections of the country being represented among the delegates present. Officials report a present membership of 2,700, an increase in the last year of 4-500. Among the important matters to be considered is the building of a home for aged and incapacitated letter carriers of Colorado Springs, Colo. A pension system will also be adopted for retiring carriers to be held in honor of the carriers in their declining years after they have been turned adrift by the government on account of ill health or old age. It is also proposed to raise the salary of letter carriers to \$10 per week. First Assistant Postmaster General Frank H. Hitchcock, who is a great favorite among the letter carriers, will deliver the principal address at a public session to be held in honor of the carriers this evening. Sessions of the convention will probably extend throughout the week. St. Paul and Omaha are among the most promising candidates for next year's convention.

SEVEN KILLED BY DERAILMENT OF TRAIN.

Charleston, W. Va., Sept. 2.—The Chesapeake & Ohio local passenger train No. 6 was derailed a mile and a quarter below Kanawha Falls, 11 miles from Charleston, about 8 o'clock to-night and as a result 7 are dead and 17 injured. One coach, combination express-mail car and baggage car left the track and overturned, rolling toward the Kanawha river. Among the dead were: Allen Loving, Hinton, law student at West Virginia university, serving as express agent during summer. J. C. Campbell, a telephone operator, A. Freeman, name unknown. Spreading rails are supposed to have caused the accident.

FRUIT FROM HAWAII.

Arrival in Chicago, First to Inland Interior of America.

Chicago, Sept. 2.—After a journey of 10 days from the plantations of Hawaii, the carload of fruit brought here as an experiment under the auspices of a Chicago association of commerce, arrived yesterday and probably will be in exhibition today. This is the first shipment of Hawaiian fruit to invade the interior of America. While the car was not opened last night to ascertain condition of the fruit, J. E. Higgins, the representative of the export station in the Hawaiian Islands, who is in charge of the car believes the fruit stood the trip first rate. The fruit will be disposed of here through the committee of the association named to conduct the display. "We raise the best pineapples in the world in Hawaii," said Mr. Higgins. "The time is not far distant when the Hawaiian pineapples will be the favored variety on the markets of the eastern and western states. They are far superior to the Florida pineapples, which are the main source of supply here now. The pineapple plantations in Hawaii are growing rapidly. It takes the annual average is 2,000. I believe that within two years it will be 10,000."

TWO KILLED IN AUTO ENDURANCE TEST.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 2.—E. V. Dusey and W. B. Felker were killed in the fifty-mile endurance automobile race at Overland park, this afternoon. Dusey was with Phil Kirk in the Apperson "Jack Rabbit" and rounding the turn was thrown out of the car. He fell on his head and his skull was crushed. He died a few minutes later. Dusey was manager of the local automobile shop and expert chauffeur. Felker was killed on the twentieth lap. A tire on his car broke and the machine tore into the fence, throwing Felker against a post. He was dead before a physician arrived.

AUSTRIAN MANEUVERS.

Long List of Casualties Causes Widespread Indignation.

Vienna, Sept. 2.—A long list of casualties among the troops engaged in the yearly maneuvers, now in progress in the neighborhood of Wiener Neustadt, has aroused widespread public indignation. Ten deaths from exhaustion already have been reported and hundreds of men have been prostrated. In the Twenty-fifth regiment of infantry alone 100 prostrations have been reported.

DESTRUCTION OF THE IENA.

Report Shows It Was Due to Lack of Harmony in French Navy.

Paris, Sept. 2.—A full report of the senatorial commission on the explosion March 12 at Toulon, which destroyed the battleship Iena, just published, charges that the destruction was due to lack of responsibility, general indifference and lack of harmony prevailing in the navy. The report also charges that the various branches of the navy service are divided by jealousy and there is no superior authority. Each branch works apart, resulting in a state of anarchy.

INDIAN BURYING GROUND.

Workmen on S. P. in Oregon Find One While Excavating for Roadbed.

Medford, Ore., Sept. 2.—While excavating for a new track of the Southern Pacific railroad near Gold Butte, 12 miles north of this city, workmen came upon what is supposed to be the burial ground of the Indians who once inhabited this valley. A number of skulls and many Indian curios were unearthed. The spot is not remembered by any of the present settlers as a burying ground, but, being near the foot of the historic Table Rock, from the top of which a number of the biggest hotels in Oregon have made overtures to him with offers of handsome salaries, but being loyal to his distinguished ancestor, this man of all ages round her little finger.
