### TWO KILLED IN AUTO ENDURANCE TEST.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 2.-E. V. Dasey and W. B. Felker were killed in the fifty-mile endurance automobile race at Overland park, this afternoon. Dasey was with Phil Kirk in the Apperson "Jack Rabbitt" and rounding the turn was thrown out of the car. He fell on his head and his skull was crushed. He died a few minutes later. ## FOUND SOFT CLAY.

Will Necessitate Driving of Piles to

#### Great Depth.

The presence of soft clay under the site of the proposed Oregon Short Line depot will necessitate the driving Line depot will necessitate the driving of piles to an immense depth. This was announced after John D. Isaacs had spent the greater portion of the day in consultation with W. H. Ban-croft, vice president and general man-ager of the Oregon Short Line and other boal officials of the Short Line. D. H. Patterson, architect for the Southern Facific at San Francheco, was also present at the meeting. Mr. Isaacs is Harriman's engineer and building expert. He gives his O. K. to all big improvements before actual con-struction commences. His visit here was made to decide finally upon the plans and specifications of the depot planned for this city. And as explained it was found it will be necessary to put piles to a depth of fifty feet or ao. Two tunnels are to be built from the passenger depot to the freight depot which will cross the yard be-low the tracks. Freight will be handled through one and express through the other. Mr. Isaacs in discussing the proposed depot after the conference said Sait Lake is going to get a larger depot than was at first planned for this city. It is seen that Sait Lake is to be a big railroad, industrial and commercial center and to provide for railroad business of the next few years big improvements are absolute-ig imperative. The depot was planof piles to an immense depth. This

The depot was plan-ned at a cost of half a million dollars originally but changes and new additions decided upon since the plans were first ac-cepted mean the expenditure of much more money. Five umbrella sheds are to be built over the passenger tracks instead of four. Other important changes are to be carried out. It is announced the structure will be com-pleted within a year. A steam shovel is doing some preliminary cutting at the present time and actual excava-tion will commence within the next few days. few days.

## INDIAN BURYING GROUND.

Workmen on S. P. in Oregon Find One

Medford, Or., Sept. 2 .- While excavating for a new track of the Southern Pacific for a new track of the Southern Pacific railroad near Gold Mill, 12 miles north of this city, workmen came upon what is supposed to be the burial ground of one of the tribes of Indians once inhebit-ing this valley. A number of skulls and many Indian curios were unearthed. The spot is not remembered by any of the plomeer settlers as a burying ground, but, being near the foot of the historic Table Rock, from the top of which a number of the Rogue River Indians rush-ed down the steep side to death, it is belleved by many that the remains are those of that now long extinct tribe.
