The streets committee did not take very kindy to the offer of P. J. Moran to sell the city gravel and dirt taken from the streets excavated for paving and ma-cadamizing. Moran's offer for the city's own dir: was if cents a block for every lond hauled more than four blocks from where it was taken from the street and all under four blocks was to be hauled free of charge. The committee agreed to pay him 25 cents a load for gravel hauled eight blocks and 5 cents a block for each additional block after that. The sanitary committee looked over the contract and plans for the handing of the city's garbage by Herman Bamberger and made a few slight changes in the wording of the contract. The bins for loading the garbage in the cars will be in garbage time construction work will be commenced on the bins on Mon-day, and it is expected that the new gar-bage service will be in operation in about a month.
