## LOCAL BRIEFS.

U. C. T. Settling Day—The last business details connected with the late U. C. T. convention will be settled this evening, at the Commercial club.

N. E. A. Meeting in February—State Supt. Nelson announces that the next meeting of the National Educational association will be held at Chicago, Feb. 23-25.

Back to Old Level—The level of the great lake has shrunk 4 of a foot in two weeks, and is now at 3.2 feet above the zero mark, the same record as was chronicled a year ago at this time.

Col. T. G. Webber Home—Col. T. G. Webber has returned from an extended trip down the St. Lawrence to Quebec, and the Thousand Isles. He went for rest and recreation, and found the complete change he was in search of.

Dixie to Send Exhibit—Thomas Judd left last night for St. George, where he will arrange for Dixie's exhibit of fruits and nuts at the irrigation congress to be held at Albuquerque. He returns to Salt Lake on the 18th inst.

End of Resort Season—On and after Tuesday next, the winter schedule on the Saltair road will be observed; viz., trains will leave Salt Lake at 10 a. m., 12:30 p. m., and 4:30 p. m. This gives an hour and a half for bathing.

Speeding Cost \$10—In Judge Diehl's court yesterday afternoon, J. C. Brown, a young automobile driver, admitted he was guilty of violating the speed ordinance by driving an automobile on South Temple street at a greater speed than sanctioned by the law. He was fined \$10.

Caught in the Act—A man answering the name of Frank Howard, entered the store of J. Burrows & Company, late yesterday afternoon, picked up two pairs of trousers and started out. The police were called and Howard was placed under arrest before he had got to the headquarters on the charge of petit larceny.

Eagles Homeward Fly—Delegates from the east to the Eagles' convention at Seattle now returning home, are dropping off in Salt Lake every day. "To see the sights," they are being entertained by the local brotherhood. They all go to the tabernacle at noon to attend the organ recital. Deputy grand president of the Eagles returned from an eight months' lecturing tour in the east, so the order here will give him a reception this evening.

Saloon Under Suspicion—Tony Soscio, who has been charged with running a disorderly saloon at West 4th, was before the commissioners yesterday to answer to the charge. Soscio denied the truth of the complaints made by neighbors that his place was "noisy," and as one of the complainants were present to make their charges good, Soscio was discharged with a caution that his license would be revoked unless he maintained an orderly place.

McBurney Cup Celebration—It is announced by the board of management of the Y. M. C. A. that a McBurney memorial cup celebration will be held Saturday evening at the Y. M. C. A. lobby. The certificate that won this international trophy, as well as the local examination certificates will be awarded to the winners of the students of the Y. M. C. A. institution upon this occasion. Invitations have been issued for the affair and an enthusiastic gathering is promised.

Coal Orders Being Placed—Local coal dealers are expressing gratification at the fact that householders are walking up to the necessity of doing something in the way of storage for the coming winter, and are ordering coal with which to heat their homes for the winter. Tenants of rented premises who are uncertain from month to month about their tenancy, are in something of a quandary as to how they are coming out in the matter of coal storage.

Women Badly Scared—An excited foreigner started on a rampage on Commercial street last night and threatened to murder two women. He was armed with a revolver and threatened to shoot when the women screamed for help. He ran up Commercial street and darted into a saloon, where he was captured by Patrolman Olson. The latter disarmed the man and locked him in the matter of coal storage.

His future home in accompanying Mrs. Shepherd will be Prof. Shepherd's young brother, Charles, who goes east to study music, his proficiency on the piano having long distinguished him.

Fight in Saloon—There was a lively fight in the Alamo saloon on Commercial street about 10 o'clock last night, between John G. Smith and Forest Land. The two have been working at Wandanore for some time and were apparently on the best of terms until last night. Just what started the row between them is not known. Smith suddenly struck Land a vicious blow in the eye, knocking him down and out. The force of the blow carried Smith through the glass sash of the door, and his right hand was badly cut in several places. ## BANKERS CALL LAWSON NAMES

Salt Lake Financiers Laugh at "National Stock" Scheme to Fight the System.

### PAMPHLET IS COMIC OPERA

Famous Muckraker is Soliciting Subscriptions to Scheme Through the Mails All Over the Country.

The "News" in common with other papers of the country, is in receipt of a pretentious pamphlet called "National Stock." It is written to exploit and boom an alleged commercial organization called the "Bay State company," which is organized to fight the trusts, with capital of one billion of dollars, in 20,000,000 shares, the capital to be capable of "increase to any number of billions," free from taxation, backed by a sovereign state, has now 60,000 stockholders. It is intended to have 20,000,000 stockholders; the only corporation in existence today, whose scope and legal and strategic powers are unlimited; chartered to own and operate banks, trust companies, railroads, industries, and to buy and sell and hold its own and any stock in existence, and to carry on any and all kinds of business. The author of the pamphlet, who is the projector of this company and the writer of the pamphlet, it is written in a florid, rambling, hortatory style, with a descriptive covering a long, elaborate detail ranging far into the wilderness of the improbable, if not the impossible; indulging in such flowery imagery of expectation, and in such prophetic visions into dream land, that the ordinary method of a quick, hot air brick schemes "pale their ineffectual fire" before it.

A representative of the "News" showed the pamphlet to officials in Salt Lake banks today, and in each and every case, there was a smile of incredulity at once, followed by remarks that at once showed their opinion of Mr. Lawson.

In the Utah National bank he was characterized by Cashier Rodney Badger as the most accomplished pirate that ever sailed a ship, an ideal financial wildcat, a dreamer of frenzied finance.

At the Commercial National bank, Lawson was referred to as a person of no financial status whatever, a wild idealist, a person whose ideas had no practical basis whatever, one whose views ought not for a moment to command the serious attention of any sound minded and sober thinking business man.

At the Deseret National bank, Mr. Lawson was laughed at as one who had been fooled at a shabby, unreliable, a person of wild commercial vagaries, of absolutely nonsensical views and opinions. In fact, Mr. Ritter and other officials there did not think it was worth while to give Lawson's pamphlet any consideration whatever. His views were considered of the pyrotechnic order, dazzling to look upon, but of no substantial worth.

Other local banking men regard the Lawson pamphlet as a sort of comic opera, a wild extravaganza—something to make people laugh, but invest? Never!
