

A PHILANTHROPIC PLAN.—Some gentlemen of wealth and influence are discussing plans for the relief of the colored people who are thrown on the community for support by the chances of war. They propose to purchase some extensive tracts of land in the neighborhood of Worcester, Mass., and in New Hampshire, where tenement houses can be erected at small cost, and where the industrious habits of the people will afford an excellent example to the poor negro. It is supposed that factories will furnish ample work for the male and female children, while the farming knowledge of the fathers can be put to good account on the lands. It is hoped that the prejudice against color will not be found to prevail in those parts of the country, as it does in other portions, and that the children of the blacks will be allowed to mingle freely with those of the white inhabitants in schools and out of them, and that the privileges of equality in churches, hotels, railway cars, theaters and public places in general will be readily extended to them by the enlightened people of Massachusetts. It is estimated that the expense of colonizing twenty thousand blacks in Mass chusetts will only be about one-tenth part of the expense of sending them to Liberia or Central America. We have nothing to say in favor of the plan.—[Journal of Commerce.

THE LOWER CLASS.—Who are they? The toiling millions, the laboring men and women, the farmer, the mechanic, the artist, the inventor, the producer? Far from it. These are nature's nobility—God's favorites—the salt of the earth. No matter whether they are high or low in station, rich or poor in pelf, conspicuous or humble in position, they are the 'upper circle' in the order of nature, whatever the factitious distinction of fashionable society. It is not low; it is the highest duty, privilege, pleasure, for the great men and the whole-souled women to earn what they possess, to work their way through life, to be the architects of their own fortune. Some may remark the classes we have alluded to are only relatively low, and in fact the middle classes. We insist that they are absolutely the very highest. Is there a class of beings on earth who may properly be denominated low? If so, it is composed of those who consume without producing, who dissipate the earnings of their fathers or relatives without laboring or doing anything themselves.

EXCELLENT DEFINITION OF GOOD MANNERS.—A writer in the Atlantic thus describes what we are always theorizing about:—"The world has always been charmed with fine manners, and why should it not? For what are fine manners but this: to carry your soul on your lip, in your eye, in the palm of your hand, and yet to stand not naked, but clothed by your individual quality—v's ble, yet inscrutable—given to the hearts of others, yet contained in your own bosom—noble and humanely open, yet duly reticent and secured from invasion. Polished manners often disappoint us; good manners never. The former may be taken on by a diligent soul; the latter imply a noble and opulent nature."

NEW FIELD PIECE.—A small three-inch rifled piece, said to be a Prussian invention, was recently tested at Fortress Monroe, and excelled in range any guns recently tried there. It was posted near the wharf, and, at an elevation of about thirty degrees, recently sent shells into the woods at Sewall's Point, where their explosion could be seen and heard. The lowest estimate of the distance is over five miles.
