

GOLDFIELD MINE OWNERS STAND PAT

Will Listen to Atty. Hilton of the Federation but Will Not Recede from Their Position.

HIS PROPOSITION UNKNOWN.

Said to be Authorized to Make Important Concessions, Even to Removal of Some Members.

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 19.—The mine owners of Goldfield will listen to the proposition that Atty. O. N. Hilton, acting for the Western Federation of Miners, has to present, although there is but the remotest possibility that any compromise can be made at this late day.

A letter was received by the Goldfield Mine Owners' association this afternoon from Atty. Hilton asking that a meeting at which he may be present to present the proposition of the Western Federation be arranged. No reply to this has been sent by the association, but President Dowden stated tonight that a reply will be sent in the morning and that it will be favorable to such a meeting.

What the proposition is which Atty. Hilton has to offer has not been revealed, but the mine owners are emphatic in their statement that no compromise looking to the abandonment of the position taken by them, that any miner who goes to work must renounce the Western Federation, will be accepted.

Secy. Erb also issued a statement tonight as follows: "The position taken by the Mine Owners' association, which has been given to the public and published through the press, is irrevocable. While the association is willing to receive Mr. Hilton and discuss the situation with him, the association cannot reconsider the position it has taken."

Atty. Hilton has stated that he is authorized to make important concessions, even to the removal of some of the members of the Western Federation who may be considered by the mine owners as agitators, from the mine.

The mines have been in operation today, and are working tonight with about the same number of men as

AHEARN RE-ELECTED PRESIDENT OF MANHATTAN

New York, Dec. 19.—John D. Ahearn, Democrat, who 19 days ago was relieved of the office of president of the borough of Manhattan by Gov. Hughes, today was elected by the board of aldermen to succeed himself. He received 24 votes, against 12 for Max F. Griffith, Republican. Ahearn's supporters included all the Democratic members of the board in this borough, and in addition he received the votes of three Republican and four Municipal Ownership league aldermen.

The galleries of the aldermanic chamber were crowded with spectators, and the result of the balloting and the administration of the oath of office to Ahearn, which immediately followed, were greeted with tremendous cheers.

Ahearn's removal by the governor followed an investigation into the affairs of the office, which was made at his own request, after charges had been sustained, but in his communication directing the removal of the borough president from office he said that nothing had been disclosed which in any way tended to impeach Ahearn's personal honesty.

In calling the meeting to order Mayor McClellan read his message, in which he ruled that the election of Ahearn to succeed himself would be

out of order as a nullification of the governor's removal. He said, however, that in view of the seriousness of the case he would permit an appeal to be taken from his ruling. It was taken, and the ruling was voted down, 21 to 12.

Mr. Ahearn then was regularly nominated and elected. Only one ballot was required to settle the issue. John P. Ahearn has been a Tammany district leader for many years.

HUGHES SAYS NOTHING.

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 19.—Gov. Hughes, when he was informed of the action of the board of aldermen in electing John P. Ahearn president of the borough of Manhattan, notwithstanding the governor's action in removing him from office, declined to make any comment as to whether, if anything, he would do in the premises.

WOMAN CONVICT PARDONED.

Helena, Mont., Dec. 19.—The state board of pardons today approved the action of Gov. Toole in granting a pardon to Elizabeth Morrison, a Butte woman who, upon conviction for a manslaughter charge for the killing of Richard Flanagan, had been sentenced to the penitentiary for three years.

M. C. CARROLL DEAD.

Was Noted Pioneer Guide of Wyoming and Government Employee.

Laramie, Wyo., Dec. 19.—Michael C. Carroll, a pioneer guide, died at his home here today. He was a native of Ireland and related to the Carrolls of Carrollton. He was master of transportation of the United States government at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., in 1854. He selected the site for Fort Sanders, three miles south of Laramie, in 1866, when the Union Pacific railroad was being built, and acted as mediator with the Indians, going unarmed to meet Chief Friday, who was on the warpath, and preventing a slaughter of whites.

Mr. Carroll leaves three daughters, one of whom is Mrs. W. H. Bins of Salt Lake.

PRESIDENT ASKS FOR NEWS OF GOLDFIELD.

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 19.—Gen. Funston left Goldfield this morning for San Francisco. The question of whether the troops will be recalled at once is still undecided, but the prevailing opinion is that at the least a portion of the number how here will remain for some time yet. President Roosevelt has asked for more information regarding conditions here forthwith, and telegrams are being sent to him from all of the civic organizations, the Mine Owners' association, the local miners' union and the commission sent to investigate the situation.

This morning Atty. O. N. Hilton, special counsel for the Western Federation of Miners, conferred with the executive committee of the local miners' union over a proposition to be presented to the mine owners later today or early tomorrow. Just what this proposition is cannot be ascertained, but that it will be anything that the mine owners will care to accept is doubtful.

As it will not contain a promise to renounce the Western Federation and act independently, it is the belief of Atty. Hilton that the refusal of the mine owners to accept the proposition offered will have a tendency to help the side of the Western Federation before the commission. He will prepare a statement from the miners and the commission later. The mines and mills are working today with practically the same number of men as yesterday. The large importation of men to take the places of the striking Western Federation men does not materialize. The mine owners say they are coming, but there are no signs of their approach.

FIRST TRAIN UNDER HUDSON.

New York, Dec. 19.—The first train will be run under the Hudson river today. The train will start from the Hoboken terminal and will run through the McAdoo tunnel under the river and down to the station at Nineteenth street and Sixth avenue, Manhattan. The officers of the company, which has built the tunnel and the engineers will compose the party which will occupy the first car to run under the river. It is expected that the tunnel will be open for the public late in January.

ALFRED H. SMITH ACQUITTED.

New York, Dec. 19.—Alfred H. Smith, vice president of the New York Central Railroad company was acquitted today of a charge of manslaughter, brought in connection with the wreck of the Brewster Express at Woodlawn, last February in which 24 persons were killed. Justice Kellogg directed the verdict.
