The Sewerage Question .- Yes terday afternoon Brother Alfred Best called for the purpose of draw. ing our attention to some facts that had come under his personal observation on the matter of Sewerage, a question receiving some consideration in this city at present. While

in Chesterfield, Darbyshire, England, a year or two since, he observed the system that existed there. The authorities of that city solved the question of a depository for the sewage by purchasing a large tract of land—seventy acres, more or less. The manner of conveying it to this ground was by liquifying and con-ducting it in large tile pipes, made in short sections and joint-ed.
