Redemption of International Revenue, Check and Proprietary Stamps.

Internal Revenue Collector Hollister furnishes the following which all Territorial papers are requested to copy, but not as a chargeable advertisement.

In view of the repeal, on and after July 1, 1883, of all taxes payable by check and proprietary stamps, the Commissioner prescribes the following regulations governing their redemption.

1. Check or proprietary stamps presented for redemption should be addressed to "The Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C.," and must be forwarded at the risk and expense of the consignor.
2. The stamps should be accompanied by a claim, on Form 81, copies of which form will be furnished upon application to this Office (Walter Evans, Com. Int. Rev., Washington, D. C.).
3. Claims may be sworn to or affidavits made before, any internal revenue officer authorized to administer oaths, without fee. Any other person administering an oath or affirmation must show, by seal or certificate from the proper authority, that he is qualified to do so. An officer in signing a jurat should give the title of his office.
4. Check and general proprietary stamps will be reduced at their face value, less 5 per centum; private proprietary stamps at their face value, less 5 or ten per centum, according to the rate of commission allowed on their purchase. Stamps may be exchanged for check or other proprietary stamps of equal value until July 1, 1883.
5. Imprinted stamps may be presented for redemption and cancellation at once, instead of waiting till July 1st, in sheets, or bound books, or in pads; if the latter they must be separated before presentation.

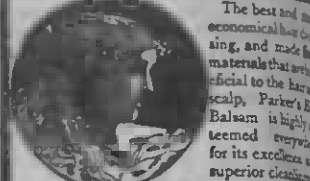
