THE FOURTH IN THE SETTLEMENTS.

ST. GEORGE, July 5, 1874.

Yesterday, the 4th, was spent in a very agreeable manner by our citizens. The day's proceedings were, at sunrise firing of cannon, hoisting of flags under the direction of Capt. George Jarvis, music and serenading of citizens by the bands, assembling at the Tabernacle at 10 o'clock a. m. (Col. A. P. Hardy, marshal of the day), singing by the choir, prayer by the chaplain (Patriarch Wm. G. Perkins), reading of Declaration of Independence by Col. Alden A. M. Jackson, oration by A. F. Macdonald, Esq., music by Capt. Eardley's brass band, singing by the St. George Glee Club, under the leadership of Brother Joseph Judd. Recitations and songs by Bros. Henry Shult, Joseph Orton, Bernard McAdams, Brigham Reese, Ebenzer DeFreeze, Thomas Judd, Kuhn, Darnley, and Saml. L. Adams, volunteer sentiments and toasts.

After the benediction all those who assisted in the exercises of the day were invited by the committee of arrangements to adjourn to the large room in the Court House and partake of wine, crackers, fruit, etc., where two hours were spent in a very pleasant, sociable manner. The committee of arrangements were David Milne, Richard Morris, Joseph Orton, Saml. L. Adams, John M. Moody, Cannon and band music finished the day.

Our farmers here have been very busy in the harvest field for the last two weeks, but hands are scarce and they are afraid they will lose considerable of the grain before it can be secured, it is so ripe and the weather is so scorching, on the 3rd it was 112 deg. in the shade. Our fruits are ripening fast, apricots and apples in abundance, also currants.

For the present, lumber hauling from Mt. Trumbull is postponed on account of the dry and dusty state of the roads. Last week Bro. James Andrus lost a very fine mule. Cause of death, alkali dust lodging in the lungs. The Temple is slowly progressing. There are few men that can endure the extreme heat they have to withstand on the walls now every day. Can't some inventive Yankee plan a nice handy portable shade for such work? It might pay as well as wooden hams and nutmegs.

The general health of the community is good, and amongst us the spirit of the Lord prevails.

BY TELEGRAPH.

FOREIGN.

PARIS, 11.—An article in to-day's *Figaro*, inciting revolt against the decision of the Assembly, occasioned much irritation among the deputies. There was a warm debate on the article, during which Depeigne, a monarchist, announced that *Figaro* had been suspended for two weeks; nevertheless the Left moved an interpellation, which was postponed for a month.

Brisson, of the extreme Left, moved that the writer of the objectionable article be called to the bar of the House, and accused the government of partiality in its punishment of journals. Brisson's motion was rejected, after a speech by Gambetta, in which he hinted that the Assembly was a corpse fit for the grave digger.

PARIS, 12.—The committee of thirty has appointed sub-committees to draw up bills for the organization of the executive powers, and the establishment of a senate. The extreme Right publish a disavowal of hostility to President MacMahon, but they condemn the action of the ministry with regard to the manifesto of the Count de Chambord.

The *Moniteur* says that ex-President Thiers is decidedly opposed to the organization of MacMahon's powers.

LONDON, 12.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg denies that the young Duke Nicholas, who stole his mother's diamonds, has been sentenced to banishment, but says that his case is still pending before the Emperor.

A violent thunder storm on Saturday caused several fatal accidents.
