EASTERN.

Assigned to Duty in London-Working Well.

WASHINGTON, 13.—Ex-Senator

Cattell, who has been appointed

special Treasury agent to negotiate

a new loan, will be assigned to duty

in London.

Congress will be asked for addi-

tional legislation to place the Treas-

ury Bank Note Redemption Bureau in

such a condition as to enable it to

meet all requirements without a

possibility of future suspension.

The organization of the bureau of

internal revenue is working so

well that no recommendations will

be made to Congress for its amend-

ment. The commissioner says that

owing to the reduction in the num-

ber of articles of merchandise, and the

consolidation of the duties of the

officers, the taxes are more easily

collected than under the former

laws, with less opportunity for

fraud, very few cases of which are

reported.

Resignation of Busted.

The resignation of Richard M.

Busted, U. S. Judge for Alabama,

has been received and accepted by

the President; his successor has not

been announced.

A Large Vote.

WHEELING, W. Va., 13.—A very

large vote was polled in this city

to-day.

Democrat Elected.

TOLEDO, O., 13.—Partial returns

from this district show the election

of Hurd, Dem., for Congress, by 800

to 1,000 majority; the democrat also

claim Lucio county by a small

majority.

The Southern Republican Con-

vention.

CHATTANOOGA, 13.—The South-

ern Republican convention, after

organizing temporarily, and ap-

pointing committees on creden-

tials and organization, adjourned

till four p. m. North and South

Carolina are not represented. On

the convention from the Republican

Congressional Executive Com-

mittee, containing a copy of a

Wool.

PHILADELPHIA, 13.—The stock-

holders of the California and Texas

railway construction company met

here to-day. A lengthy discussion

was held upon the scheme previously

devised, by which the affairs of

the company may be reorganized

and their interests advanced; the

plan was adopted. The main pro-

vision is the changing of the Texas

and Pacific first mortgage bonds

from \$40,000 to \$20,000 per mile, and

to issue a second mortgage on the

land grant bonds at \$20,000 per

mile, and sell them respectively at

85 and 40 cents. Eighty-five per

cent of the company's creditors

have agreed to accept these bonds

in liquidation of their indebtedness.
