BARCLAY, NEVADA.

The "Clover Valley" of Early Days—Home of Lyman L. Woods.

Barclay, Nevada, March 22.—This place that is now called Barclay is the old Clover Valley, and was first occupied by the whites in 1868, when it was said twenty-five families located here but were forced to leave on account of Indian trouble. It was permanently settled in 1869, by Lyman L. Woods and others. There are now seven families located here, most of them members of the Woods family. This place is twenty-five miles from Panguitch, Nevada, and thirty miles from Hebron, Utah. The water is scarce so that the farming is limited. This has been a good stock country, but years of drought have depleted the range and the grass is gone. The grade constructed by the Union Pacific railway some years ago goes through here and some very heavy work has been done. Mr. McCartney was through here examining the grade, but for what company it was not known. People are hopeful that the track will be built here soon.

Lyman L. Woods, who presides here, was one of Utah's early settlers, coming to Utah in 1848, as a teamster for President Brigham Young, and was the first owner of the corner lot where the Gardo house stands. He afterwards moved to Provo. From there he was called by the Church to settle on the Muddy and from there came to Clover Valley, where he has made his home ever since.
