

There is also a variety with red blossoms and variegated leaves, which is extremely scarce."

We are not aware that there is a plant of this highly ornamental tree in Utah Territory; yet this is no reason why we should not have. We are confident that it would thrive well here.

The Baltimore Democratic Convention

On the 18th of June, the National Democratic Convention, pursuant to the adjournment taken at Charleston on the 3d day of May, met at Baltimore, and resumed the sectional wrangling that characterized the proceedings at the metropolis of the Palmetto State, when it was suspended by the breaking up of the first Convention, the lapse of time nor intervening circumstances having had no effect seemingly upon the delegates, to induce them to pursue a more quiet and conservative course in their deliberations and actions, and mend, if possible, the breach that had been made in their party ranks by the secession of the South.

Mr. Cushing resumed the chair. Delegates from the States that seceded at Charleston were in attendance and claimed their seats—the same individuals that were delegates from those States to the Richmond Convention, which met on the 11th and adjourned till the 21st of June, that the delegates might attend at Baltimore and take part in the strife there, and then if the result was not satisfactory, they would return to Richmond, nominate a candidate, and adopt a platform strictly their own, particularly adapted to the political dogmas of the southern wing of the great Democratic party.

The admission of those delegates was strongly opposed, and up to the time of adjournment on the evening of the second day, the committee on credentials had not reported.

What was done on the third day we do not know further than by the telegraphic dispatch published last week. It appeared that they had a stormy session; there was no nomination made and the prospects were very gloomy indeed.
