The enforce-ment of this act, however, with refer-ence to the constwise trade, presents a much more difficit problem. There are now 4;125 yessels engaged in the coastwise trade of the islands. Of this number only 22 are American ships. With the whole number of ships nov participating in this trade, the tonnage is said to be entirely inadequate and the passenger service wretched. LIGHT DRAFT VESSELS.

It is suggested that the building of light draft vessels to participate in this carrying business presents a splendid opportunity for the profitable investopportunity for the prohlable invest-ment of American capital, and the uncertainty as to probable future con-gressional action on this subject is as-serted to be the reason why no steps are being taken to subply the coming imperative demand for American-built ships.

AMINISTRATIVE CHANGES.

Col. Edwards calls attention to what Col. Edwards calls attention to what he terms "the second stage of develop-ment for the Philippine government." The change from a military to a civil government has developed many intri-cate questions of law. overnment. EDUCATION OF FILIPINOS.

The education of Fillpino youths in this country for the purpose of mak-ing them the future teachers of the na-tive schools of the Island has begun under an act passed last aummer by the insular government. Ninety-eight young Fillpinos are now on their way young Finipinos are now on their way to this country for that purpose. They will attend the grammar schools of southern California during the winter and in the spring be distributed through the west and eastern portion of the United States for further in-

THE CIVIL SERVICE.

Through an amendment to the civil service regulations of the United States, made by President Roosevelt, to take effect April 16 next, transfers will be allowed from the civil employes of the Philippines to government positions in this country, thus accomplishing an end this country, thus accomplishing an end which has been vigorously contended for by Col. Edwards for some time, and making efficient service in the Philippines a stepping stone to better places at norae, and thus raising the standard of efficiency and creating a new inducement to desirable clerks.
