WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 25.01 inches; temperature at 5 a. m., 46 degrees; maximum, 59; minimum, 44; mean, 52, which is 4 deg. below normal. Deficiency of the daily mean temperature since the first of the month, 1.31 inch, which is 1.35 inch above the normal.

Excess in precipitation since Jan. 1, 4.06 inches.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the North Pacific states and lake region, and lowest over the northern Rocky Mountain slope and southern plateau region.

Precipitation occurred over portions of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, North Dakota, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Missouri, South Dakota, Minnesota, Manitoba and British Columbia. It was raining this morning at Kansas City, Portland, and St. Paul. Thunderstorms were reported over Missouri and the upper Mississippi valley. Excessive and heavy rains occurred at Kansas City, 4.02 inches, and St. Paul, 1.15 inch.

The temperature changes were slight except a decided rise over Idaho, Washington, Montana, and Arizona; and a marked fall over North Dakota, South Dakota and Manitoba.

LOCAL BRIEFS.

Rabbi Reynolds will lecture this evening in the Jewish temple on "The Compensation of Death."

James Ward, a Highland Boy smelter hand, sustained severe injuries yesterday afternoon, by falling from a 25 foot scaffold. He was removed for treatment to the Murray hospital.

The daughters of the Confederacy will meet tomorrow at 3 p. m., at the residence of Mrs. Judge Hall, Seventh East and South 7th, to prepare for Decoration day exercises.

Emery county sheepmen say that the Manti forest reserve officer has deprived them of their summer grounds, and now they must ship their sheep into Wyoming and Colorado for the season. The latest arrivals are doing well.

H. A. Petersen, who has just been released from the state prison, is in trouble again. He will now have to answer to a complaint alleging the forging of G. Weller's name to a check for \$65.50, which was cashed by Fred Christensen in June of last year.

The annual convention of the Evangelical Salt Lake County Sunday School association opens its sessions this evening in the First Methodist church, and lasts through three days. A feature in tonight's program will be a boys' chorus, and Rev. Benjamin Young will lecture on "That Boy."

There will be a civil service examination in this city June 1 for technical and professional positions in the government laboratories at Manila. Salaries range from \$1,400 to \$3,500; also, for the position of engineer in the Indian service, June 15, with salaries ranging up to \$1,000 per annum.

The department of agriculture at Washington has shipped to the care of the Utah Silk commission a consignment of mulberry cuttings for grafting, as well as young trees. The finding east of a market for cocoons, it is believed, will give an impetus to this industry in Utah.

Bert Nelson, the cyclist and aeronaut, nearly came to grief yesterday, at the Salt Palace, while practicing the Diavolo loop. He missed his connections, and did some traveling through space for which he was entirely unprepared. However, the young man fell in the mud unhurt, and is trying it again.

Niels Hansen, a pioneer resident of Sanpete, is up from Mantel for the purpose of placing his wife in the hospital, where next week she is to undergo an operation for the removal of a cancer from the left breast. Mrs. Hansen is 45 years of age and has been afflicted for more than a year. At present she is under the care of Dr. Richards, who is doing everything possible to strengthen her for the trying ordeal. The operation will be performed on Thursday, and the lady's many friends hope that it may be thoroughly successful and result in her complete restoration to health and strength.

Dr. A. B. Peak and wife, have just returned to Salt Lake after an absence of several months. The trip was made overland, leaving home in September. Several weeks were spent in southern Utah, where they found an honest, thrifty people most cordial in their entertainment to strangers. Through the influence of Dr. Richards, of Provo, they were invited to join a party starting on a hunting trip to the Buckskin mountains, Greenland, and Bright

Angelo points, and also to visit the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. Both from point of scenery and game this side trip was thoroughly enjoyed. A great part of their road lay along the route of the Clark railroad. This was kept lively by camps of graders and construction workers, dirt flying and business being done with a push. The winter months were spent in southern California.

DEFENDANTS ENJOINED.

Ogden Sewer Pipe Company Not Permitted to Sell Its Property.

(Special to the "News.")
Ogden, May 6.—This morning Judge Rolapp rendered his decision in the action brought by R. S. Joyce et al vs Ogden Sewer Pipe & Clay company, granting plaintiffs a restraining order as prayed for, enjoining the defendant from selling its interests in this city.

In rendering his decision the court said it was strange that the business should collapse so suddenly after having been prosperous for so many years and he could hardly believe it necessary to sell the property to satisfy the demands of creditors.

The divorce case of Martha Ferrin vs Orson T. Ferrin was heard this morning and after the taking of testimony which went open June 14, 1902, Judge Rolapp rendered his decision, granting a divorce and the custody of their three minor children.

After Attorney Lessner asked the court's permission to file a cross complaint in the case but as the decree had been already signed he was instructed that he would have to file a motion to set aside the decree.

Judge Rolapp this morning heard the case of Ogden City vs John Smith, a barber, charged with violating the Sunday ordinance, by keeping his barber shop open June 14, 1902. He was found guilty and fined \$5, the fine being a nominal one from the fact that Atty. McMillan for the defense gave notice that he would ask the court to set aside the decree.
