UNITED STATES COMMISSION FISH AND FISHERIES, Washington, D. C.,

November 27th, 1880. Dear Sir-The eggs of the species of salmonidæ mentioned below are being matured by the United States Fish Commission, and I write to ask what number you are desirous of receiving on behalf of your State, to be hatched out and planted in public waters. They will be ready for distribution during the months of January, February and March, 1881. No charge will be made for the eggs themselves, but the expense of transportation from the hatching houses must be paid by the recipients. Due notice will be given by telegraph or otherwise of the time of shipment of any eggs that are assigned to you. It will of course be understood that the supply of eggs is limited, so that no larger number should be asked for than can properly be hatched and distributed. The eggs will be supplied to localities, the temperature and the waters of which are known to be favorable to the growth of the fish asked for. Should (as it is possible) the aggregate of eggs be less than the number for which application is made, a pro rata reduction will be made.
