THE OFFENDING LETTER.

"Caracas, 8th April, 1908.—Refer-ring to your letter of the 24th of Feb-ruary, I am sorry to inform you that the present time is anything but fav-orable for business. The system of government (since 1899) of the pres-ent almost dictatorial ruling president, which is economically for the creation and afterwards always for the annull-ment of monopolles, through all kinds of subtleties, has very nearly ruined the country. Willemstad, Aug. 2.—The Dutch crul-ser Gelderland arrived here today from La Guira, Venezuela. Her commander declares that he sent a boat ashore at La Guira with an officer and was refused all means of communication with the shore. The authorities there, he says, declined to accept the letter bags and an official communication to the German minister, who is in charges of subtleties, has very nearly ruined the country. The only ray of light in these dark days through which Vene-zuela struggles is the price of cocca, but this is not sufficient to make the future hopeful. "A good part of the import and ex-port trade in Venezuela is in the hands of Germans, who engage their em-ployes in Europe, chiefly at Hamburg. These young men come out generally on a contract for three years, after the expiration of which they either re-turn or, according to their fitness, gain advancement where they are. WHITE PLAGUE CRUSADE.

Moving Pictures and Phonographs to

Be Used in It.

Be Used in It. New York, Aug. 3.—Moving picture machines and phonographs will be brought into play by the state charitles aid association of New York in its cru-sade against the dread "white plague." Through this method the association hopes to bring the people of the state to a full realization of the dangers of the disease which destroyed 14,406 hu-man beings in New York state last year. The association is now prepar-ing the most striking feature ever con-ceived in its warfare against tubercu-losis. It consists of six educational ex-hibits which are soon to be started on tours through the state, to be exhib-ited at 36 county fairs. Experts are now assembling the pic-

ited at 26 county fairs. Experts are now assembling the ple-tures, data and models and each ex-hibit will tell a story in an interesting way. In addition to the pletures, large phonographs having especial records will give much information on the sub-ject. The exhibits will also contain models of perfectly lighted and venti-lated factories together with models of so-called sweat shops where tu-berculosis flourishes. Mottoes giving advice how to prevent and check tuber-culosis will be displayed about each ex-hibit.
