Osawatomie, Kan., May 14 .-- The legislative investigation of affairs in the legislative investigation of affairs in the insane asylum has resulted in some startling disclosures today. Witnesses testified that inmates were beaten by the attendants, often without any visi-ble cause. The officers of the institu-tion are blamed to a considerable extent for the system under which the asylum is conducted, but the witnesses today said that in specific instances the officers did not know of the abuses in the institution.
