ORATORY IS IMMINENT

Council Session Tonight Promises to Include Clash Over Telephone Ordinance.

This evening's city council session promises nothing startling unless something unforeseen develops—which is a situation by no means unlikely to occur in any session of the most unique parliamentary body in the west.

One measure upon which Councilman Stewart and Councilman Fernstrom are likely to clash will be the telephone license ordinance, introduced by Councilman Fernstrom at the session of the council last Monday night, and which upon recommendation of Stewart was recommended filed by the municipal clerk for committee on city and finance. The ordinance provides that the city shall have the right to use the telephone for its own purposes, and that the company pay into the city a certain number of free phones. Stewart will probably propose an amendment to the ordinance, approving the payment of the 1 cent cent gross earnings tax and the free phone clause, but not ratifying the company's rights and franchises as proposed by Fernstrom's ordinance. The independent telephone company is already paying into the city a 1 per cent gross earnings tax, and the proposition to place the Bell company on the same basis meets with favor in the council. The independent company now furnishes 54 free phones for the use of the city, but when the ordinance, or the substitute passes the council, it is likely the number of instruments to be furnished the city free of cost will probably be reduced to 40.

GOT THE PEOPLE'S MONEY.

SCHOOMBY PAPER BY MAJOR FOOTE

Former Fort Douglas Officer

Tells of the Military Needs of the United States.

HIS VIEWS ON THE MILITIA.

Reserve of the Regular Establishment Viewed as an Important and Difficult Force to Train.

Major Stephen M. Foote of the artillery service at Jackson barracks and formerly in command of the Nineteenth and Twenty-second light batteries at Fort Douglas, has an unusually able article in the last issue of the Journal of the Military Service Institution, on "The Military Necessities of the United States, and the Best Provision for Meeting Them." The actual status of the military service is admirably described, but what will specially interest the public is the descriptive matter on the militia. "The organized militia, or as it is more popularly known, the National Guard, of the several states is soon to be organized, trained, uniformed and equipped like the regular army; ready in all respects to take the field whenever called out.
