The United States Con-stitution, by express tarms, gives Congress power to 'provide for organ-izing, arming and disciplining the militia, at the same time 'reserving to the states respectively the appoint-ment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress. These provisions bring about a divi-sion of responsibility and authority between Congress on one hand and 45 or more state governments on the other. To raise the general standard of the National Guard and make it uniform upon the model of the regu-lar army was the object of the Dick bill passed by Congress five years ago. Do induce compliance with its pro-visions that iaw declared that any state failing to comply within five years should not participate in the national appropriation for the militia. One measure upon which Councilman Stewart and Councilman Fernstrom are likely to clash words is the telephone li-cense ordinance, introduced by Coun-cilman Fernstrom at the session of the council last Monday night, and which council last Monday night, and which upon recommendation of Stewart was recommended filed by the municipal laws committee at a meeting held Thursday night. The matter will be threshed out on the floor of the council tonight. The ordinance introduced by Fernstrom provides that the rights and franchises heretofore granted the Bell Telephone company be confirmed, and that the company pay into the city in lieu of license money, the sum of 1 per cent of its gross earnings each year. cent of its gross earnings each year, and furnish the city a certain number of free phones. Stewart will probably propose an amendment to the ordinpropose an amendment to the ordin-ance, approving the payment of the 1 per cent gross earnings tax and the free 'phone clause, but not ratifying the company's rights and franchises as proposed by Fernstrom's ordinance. The Independent Telephone company is already paying into the city a 1 per cent gross earnings tax, and the prop-osition to place the Beil company on the same basis meets with favor in the council. The Independent company on the substitute passes the council, it is likely the number of instruments to be furnished the city free of cost will be furnished the city free of cost will probably be reduced to 40.

"It is unquestionably the better plan to let the states keep and handle the militia in war as in peace, according to the privisions of the Constitution, subject to Federal service for only thre specific purposes: 'To execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrec-tions and repel invasions.' Their services are more likely to be needed for domestic purposes during the tur-bulence of war than during the gen-eral quiet of peace. At the same time they are on hand to turn out in ener-gencies for short periods as national forces. They thus form, in time of war as well as in peace, a military force for state purposes, and a reserve to the Federal army. Another function that they will perform, more important in some respects than either of these. Is that they will perform at all times a school from which will come most of the volunteer officers and many volun-teer enlisted men, without breaking up their organization and without unduly impairing their strength. "In raising a large number of volun-teers at one time, the recruiting field must cover the entire Union and in a systematice manner, the number re-quired from the various districts being approximately proportional to popula-tion. The only territorial divisions we have which are approximately equal in population are the congressional districts. There are, according to the last apportionment, 386 congressional the districts containing a population in the neighborhood of 200,000 each. Suppose we raise a regiment in each congressional district, each territory and the District of Columbia. One regiment to each district, at 1,100 men per regiment would give about 400,000; 1,500 men per regiment about 500,000; 780 men per regiment about 500,000; 780 men per regiment about 500,000; 780 men per regimental organization. Even one battalion or one company could be called for from each district. In any case the benefits of military in-struction and experience would be ex-tended to every part of the country. "Judging from our past experience, we may safely predict that there will be no difficulty in securing a half mil-lion volunteers at the beginning of a war. The paramount difficulty will be to secure properly qualified officers. If such officers are on hand when wanted, and have been educated to the special requirements of the organizations they are to raise, the work of enlisting volunteers and preparing them for ser-vice can be skillfully and smoothly ac-comptished. They are of ripe age and intimately conversant with the details of the in-struction that must be quickly im-pressed upon the raw levies to mold them according to the latest ideas as developed in the regular army. Then in time of peace let the colonel of each regiment be selected from the lower half of the relative list of captains of the regular army, and let him be commis-sioned as colonel of such and such a regment. The designation of the reg-ment should indicate the state, con-gressional district and arm of the ser-vice; as Fifteenth New York infantry. "The officers of each regiment should be assembled every year for a period of instruction of 10 days, and should be in camp for that time in the district, or some convenient place near it. Regiments in districts on or near the seacoasts should be designated coast-artillery and be assigned to certain near-by forts, and the officers assem-bled there for their annual instruction. Cavalry and field-artillery regiments should, of course, be from those dis-tricts where suitable horses are plen-tiful. Brigades and divisions should be located and designated, together with the location of their headquarters and place of rendezvous. • • • "The military schools and colleges having officers detailed as military in-structors turn out each year a large number of young men who have had more or less military instruction, both theotretical and practical. With the exception of a very few-perhaps 1 per cent--these men are lost sight of, and if any of them ever get into mili-tary service or continue their mili-tary instructors and students will have something definite to work for, and the government, it be pueri no take the trouble to reap the harvest.
