

## "AMERICANS" SURE TO DISINTEGRATE

This Is the Opinion of Senator George Sutherland After Viewing the Returns.

### LEAVES FOR WASHINGTON

Senator Sutherland Goes East Tomorrow to Take Up Committee Work at National Capital.

With the election safely over, it is on to Washington for Utah's congressional delegation, every member of which will find important duties awaiting him on his arrival there.

Senator George Sutherland will lead the departing delegation by getting away to Washington and to his winter's work first. He leaves Salt Lake tomorrow morning, and before the week ends he expects to be buried deep in the duties of the code commission appointed by the last session, whose work is not yet finished.

This commission worked through the entire session last spring with the pen of the United States, revising it and harmonizing all its various laws. The portion of the work he already passed the senate. The rest of the work Senator Sutherland expects will be finished by the end of the coming session.

Senator Smoot will have work awaiting him in the forestry service in connection with forming plans for the conservation of the forest areas of the United States. This work is the result of the recent conference of governors at Washington, at which President Roosevelt was authorized to name committees to devise a plan properly to conserve the resources in water, land, timber and minerals.

He has not yet announced the intended visit of his committee to Washington to work on this subject.

### "AMERICAN" OUTLOOK.

Senator Sutherland, when asked today for an expression of opinion concerning the election results, in connection with the work before the nation, said: "The American people have again demonstrated by this election their capacity for self government, and for sane, conservative action. It is fortunate from every standpoint that Taft is to become president. It is no exaggeration to say that he has been identified with the best equipment mentally, and the widest experience for the duties of his high office of any man who has ever been elected to that office.

Locally the triumph of the Republican ticket in Salt Lake county, while I have always expected it, is bigger than in my most sanguine moments I had thought possible. I believe that the results will be a tonic to normal conditions politically in this county. I do not expect the "American" party to go to pieces at once but do expect a gradual disintegration of the organization and a gradual drift of the Republicans in the "American" party back to the Republican party where they belong. I think that the Republican party is big enough to embrace them all, and they will be welcome as fast as they choose to come."

### REPORTS FROM COUNTIES.

Morgan County—Taft led by 150 majority. Spry's lead was almost as big. The entire Republican legislative and county ticket coming in on the landslide.

Boxelder—Taft's lead holds good for the entire ticket, the majority being from 150 to 200. An unusually heavy vote was polled, especially in Brigham City. At Garfield, Taft received 184, Bryan, 77; Spry, 108; Knight, 43. Howell for representative received 158 to 75 for Martineau.

Rich—Taft leads Bryan by 150 at least, while the Republican legislative ticket leads by 100. Some doubt still exists on the county ticket.

Tooele—Spry carried the county by 250 and Taft by 400. Baker for the legislature leads his Democratic opponent by 400.

Iron—Taft's lead is between 300 and 400; Spry's, 214. Howell has 300 majority, and the Republican legislative ticket is elected. J. J. Webster for the legislature leads by 200, while all the county ticket is elected.

Summit—Knight leads Spry in the returns so far. Knight, for the senate, however, Wilson, (R.), is probably elected, and for the house, Archibald has a safe majority.

Beaver—Taft secured 923 votes; Bryan, 716; John M. Murdoch, (R.), was elected to the legislature by a majority of 175. One "American" party vote was cast.

Davis—Taft and Spry both have a majority of 200, with Christopher Burton leading for the senate by a good majority.

Plute—Taft carried the county by 150. The Republican ticket showed plural majorities from 100 to 150. Haycock for the legislature was elected. Judge Childster's majority is small, and final figures may affect it.

Sevier—Richfield gives Taft and Bryan about an even vote, with a possibility that Bryan may pull out ahead. In the county Taft leads by 150. The Sevier county Republican ticket was elected, while Judge Childster may lose to Hayes (D.). Plute county is said here to be for Hayes. Spry's majority is uncertain, as scratching was heavy for Knight.

Wayne—No report.

Carbon—Taft and the Republican ticket lead by 200. The Republican legislative ticket were elected.

Utah County—Knight leads by 200.

## MAROVITCH MURDER TRIAL RESUMED

Case of State Against Austrian Presented Before Judge Armstrong.

### DEFENDANT STILL DEJECTED.

Dusan Doh Testifies to Having Witnessed the Shooting—Difficulties With Interpreters.

The trial of Steve Marovitch, charged with the murder of Mike Popich at Bingham canyon on the 11th day of last July, was resumed before Judge Armstrong in the Third district court this morning.

Every member of the jury was on hand at the appointed hour, 10 o'clock, and all witnesses were within call. Steve Marovitch, the defendant, was brought into court by Deputy Sheriff Andrew Smith, Jr. He wore a haggard appearance, and his countenance retained the downcast expression so noticeable all through the days consumed last week in securing the jury.

He occupied a seat in the courtroom near his counsel, Soren N. Christensen and J. J. Daly, who are conducting the case for defendant. Immediately at his hand sat Joe Melich, Austrian interpreter for the defense. Mrs. Marovitch, defendant's wife, remained on a bench in the corridor, to be near at hand when called to testify.

The state is represented by Dist. Atty. Frederick L. Looftbour, assisted by County Atty. Willard Hanson. Counselers for the state are Charles Schnitzler, who does the actual translating from the Austrian into English, and John Wackstein, who sits near the prosecuting attorneys and acts as check on the interpretation for the state. Wackstein looks like a blood negro, so black is his skin, and it is claimed that he speaks fluently 27 languages.

### STATE'S CASE OUTLINED.

The case of the state was outlined in a brief address by District Attorney Looftbour. He said the state expected to prove that the killing of Popich was done in cold blood, with premeditated malice, and it would be shown that the killing was the result of the religious feuds existing among the foreigners at Bingham. The state expected to show that Marovitch had threatened Popich previously at the boarding house conducted by Joe Borden, where Popich lived; and that upon the date in question, as Popich was emerging from the boarding house, with his dinner bucket in one hand and a pipe in the other, Marovitch shot him in cold blood.

The first witness called for the state was County Surveyor Joseph Swenson, who attested to the accuracy of a map locating the boarding house and scene of the killing.

### THE AUSTRIAN OATH.

Then came a feature of the trial, the swearing of the first Austrian witness in the person of Dusan Doh, who is claimed to have witnessed the shooting. Doh is a young man of sturdy build, probably 25 years of age, and a special oath was administered to him, in accordance with the usages in Austrian courts of law. The oath is so unique, and is considered so binding by the Austrians, that it is here reproduced. It is as follows:
