The man was intoxicated at the time of his arrest and it is believed that the bill was passed on him. He was locked up and will be held pending further investigation.

New Has New Target Range—Fort Douglas has now a new target range, in 151 acres of land just back of the post, which was deeded yesterday to the government by L. H. and J. A. Young. The Mt. Olivet cemetery association paid the Youngs \$12,500 for the government, the latter, in consideration of this transferring to the association the 52 acres of land immediately south of the cemetery, making the deal a three-cornered affair.

Y., have been sent to school superintendents all over the country asking their opinion on it. P. H. Christensen received one yesterday and sent an answer to the effect that he approved it. The resolution reads:

"Whereas, the textbooks used in our schools and colleges do not show a proper recognition of woman's work and influence in the history and development of man's race, therefore, it—

"Resolved, That the National Woman Suffrage Association instruct its committee on education to investigate the matter with a view to securing the publication of unbiased, complete and up-to-date text books, especially in history and civics, and to report the result of this investigation at the next regular meeting of the association.
