

HOST OF ENTRIES FOR STATE FAIR

Already Far Greater in Numbers
Than Ever Before in His-
tory of Association.

RACE MEET TO BE FEATURE.

A. B. Carstensen, Supervisor, Takes
Hold of Horse Department in
An Enthusiastic Manner.

The entries in all departments of the state fair are even now far greater in number than ever before in the history of the fair association. Secretary Knigh is busily engaged classifying the several entries, and although they are yet not closed, he feels confident that the general average for the entire fair will be fully 50 per cent greater than at any previous fair. The entries in the speed department close next Wednesday evening, and under no consideration will entries received after that time be considered. A. B. Carstensen, supervisor of this department, has taken hold of the details in an enthusiastic manner, and the greatest races ever held in the state are promised. The two big events, the Utah State Fair handicap, and the Inland Empire Exposition handicap, have attracted the attention of horsemen all over the west. Already a large number of horses are here especially for this occasion, and many more will arrive within the next two weeks.

The Inland Empire Exposition handicap will be run on Saturday, the last day of the fair, and a purse of \$500 has been hung up for the event. This day will be society day at the races, and the governor with his staff, prominent officials of the city and county, and all officers of the fair association, will occupy places of honor in the grand stand.

ENTRIES CLOSE WEDNESDAY.

Entries in all other departments close on Wednesday evening Sept. 29. Exhibitors in the live stock department especially are coming in at a surprising rate, and every indication points to the goal the management have been working to, the greatest display of live stock ever seen in the intermountain country. On Thursday of fair week the grand live stock parade will be held, which will include the very best exhibits in all branches of the industry. The Salt Lake Driving club will participate and a splendid exhibition of riding and driving horses will be made. Many fancy thoroughbreds will be exhibited from among the fast horses at the fair, and this event is expected to be one of the big features.

PRIZE AMUSEMENTS.

In the amusement section, Secy. Knigh claims to have the greatest list of attractions ever seen at an state fair. The "Desert" already has an immense number of shows booked, and many more are now under consideration. The list of new attractions will include Uncle Hyman and his educated pig. This pig drives an automobile and in many other ways shows almost human intelligence. Two cleverly trained dogs are also a part of the act, which will be seen on the fair grounds every afternoon and evening during the week. The Genette Sisters' double trapeze act comes here direct from New York city, and is claimed to be the greatest act of its kind in the world. Miss Zella and her acrobatic dog form one of the greatest combinations imaginable. This act is being seen in this country this year for the first time, but in Europe it has been a headliner in vaudeville shows for several years. One other big act is now under consideration and the contracts will likely be closed within the next few days.

BATTLE OF THE PLAINS.

President McDonald, who will have personal supervision over the Battle of the Plains, promises the greatest spectacle ever seen in this section. The details have all been completed, which includes an elaborate program of fireworks and scenic effects, which require the services of nearly 300 people, 100 of whom will be real Indians. This whole body of redmen will participate in a real war dance as a part of the evening program. The dance will be followed by the Indian regatta on the foot of the pioneers followed by a battle of 20 minutes' duration.

The fair grounds are undergoing almost a complete transformation and everything possible is being done to have everything completed for the opening day, which will be Oct. 4.

The boiler room of the mechanical laboratory, partially wrecked a year or so ago by an explosion, has been torn down to make room for a much larger plant of more modern design. The increased furnace capacity is now able to furnish sufficient steam for the steam-engine, road-testing and mechanical laboratories all of which have been considerably enlarged and otherwise improved.

The book store, which a few years ago consisted of but a small counter, a scant stock of goods, billing several shelves and a cupboard, now bids fair to be classed among the most modern both in regard to equipment and fixtures as well as the stock of books, incidental supplies, and notions.

The lunch room has been greatly improved by a new system of serving. This, together with a consignment of special dishes for the hot foods, new sinks, ovens, and freshly frescoed walls, add materially to the place. Though the prices of foodstuffs have advanced since last year, the dishes this year will be of the same size and quality for the same price.

On the grounds about 4,500 square feet of cement walks have just been completed, nearly 5,000 square feet of grading and leveling are just being finished while a large force of painters, saloonkeepers and carpenters are yet on the grounds attending to many minor changes, repairs, and improvements.

SCHOOL CHILDREN TO GREET PRESIDENT

Twenty Thousand Boys and Girls in Line—Living Flag to be a Feature.

Plans were outlined yesterday afternoon by the committee on children at a meeting in the office of Superintendent D. H. Christensen to have 20,000 boys and girls take part in the review Sunday morning, Sept. 26, when President Taft leaves Salt Lake to continue his tour of the country. Every elementary school, high school, private school and institution of learning in the county will be included in the line on Brigham street, where President Taft will pass in review.

About 2,500 children will be used in the "Living Flag," which will be presented at 8 street and South Temple street. Superintendent Christensen, E. W. Ashton of the Granite school district, and Chief of Police Samuel A. Barlow were chosen as a committee to arrange the details of the line of review on South Temple street.

It was decided that one adult will be placed in line to attend to 50 children. All the committees having in charge the entertainment of President Taft, when he arrives here the latter part of the month, met at 2 o'clock this afternoon to discuss the final details for the reception. The meeting will probably last most of the afternoon.

Final arrangements have been made by the Utah-Ohio society for the reception to be tendered President Taft during his stay here. It will be given at the University club from 6:30 to 8 o'clock Saturday evening, Sept. 25.
