 Runaway Accidents.—A team belonging to Ezra T. Walker, of Pleasant Grove, ran away at that place yesterday afternoon. In its course through the streets it came up in a group of children. The wheels of the wagon passed over a little boy, son of Mark Bennett, seriously injuring him. The vehicle was badly smashed.  
 Isaac Carlson's team also ran away with a new wagon, plow and harrow, scattering things lively. No damage except a broken vehicle.

**The Lime Quarry Accident.**—Yesterday the News stated that, in the afternoon, a man had met with a severe accident at Pascoe's lime kiln, by which he lost his left hand. Owing to the lateness of the hour we were unable to give any details.  
 The affair occurred at the lime quarry of R. Jones, not Pascoe's, north of the Warm Springs, and the victim was Thomas White, aged about twenty-five years. A couple of blasts had been prepared and the match applied to only one of them. After the explosion White went into the quarry to light the fuse of the other. Unfortunately it had been ignited by the explosion of the first and went off.  
 Immediately after the second explosion the other workmen rushed into the quarry and found Mr. White crawling out on his hands and knees. His left hand was so badly shattered that it had to be subsequently amputated by Dr. Benedict. The left eye was completely destroyed, and the face horribly disfigured, being filled with pieces of rock. The right eye was also badly injured, but we understand that Dr. Benedict has some hope that it will be saved.  
 The unfortunate man was conveyed to St. Mary's hospital. His residence is in the vicinity of the Hot Springs, a short distance north of the city. He has a wife and several children.  
 Our latest information is to the effect that there is scarcely any hope of his recovery.

**Theatre on Monday Night.**—On Monday night one of the brightest and best comedy companies on the continent will present the "Strategists" at the Theatre. The Boston Herald says:

**Territorial Educational Convention.**—At the afternoon session yesterday committees were appointed on the following subjects: Readers and spellers; arithmetic and history; geography and drawing; grammar and penmanship.  
 The convention re-assembled at 10 a. m. to-day.  
 The reports of committees were presented and partially discussed.  
 The following resolution was introduced by Dr. John R. Park, and adopted by the convention: That a committee of three be appointed by the President to consider and recommend school readers for adoption for use in the District Schools of the Territory for a period of not less than five years from the date of adoption. And that said committee have authority to call to their aid such assistance as they may deem necessary and be instructed to report at a convention to be held in the Council House, in this city, on Monday, October 2nd, 1882, at 2 p. m.  
 The chair appointed John R. Park, T. B. Lewis and M. H. Hardy said committee.  
 Recess till 1.30 p. m.

The Callenders.—Mr. Edward Marble, representing the Callender Minstrels, is in the city. The troupe will play here on Tuesday and Wednesday nights. A Colorado paper speaks as follows of the company:

**Answers to Questions.**—A correspondent writes from Elsinore, Sevier County:  
 Did the Legislature at its late session pass the act relating to sheepherds being kept at a certain distance from the settlement? Also, some of our school teachers, when calling the roll, insist on the pupils answering "perfect" instead of "present." How can the word perfect be used properly in that sense?  
 1st. The act in relation to sheepherders was not passed.  
 2nd. If the roll call is for the mere purpose of ascertaining the attendance, the requirement to answer "perfect," is absurd. When it is to ascertain the status of the pupils in reference to their lessons, in those schools where there is a scale of degrees, defined by numbers, it might be proper, for those reaching the highest point of excellence on the scale to answer "perfect," while those who fail to get to that degree of advancement would answer according to the number attained.

**Religious Services.**—Religious services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to-morrow afternoon, at the Assembly Hall, commencing at 2 o'clock.  
**A Deliberate Thief.**—Yesterday evening, Henry Newman, a tramp, walked coolly into the house of Mrs. Covey, in the 12th Ward, picked up a watch, and asked the good lady if she wished to sell it. Receiving a negative answer, he pretended to lay the article down, but deliberately walked off with it. When he got outside he started off on a run. The police subsequently caught him with the watch on his person. To-day, Justice Pyper sentenced him to pay a fine of \$50, which he will work out on the streets.

**Funeral Services at Bountiful.**—Yesterday, Friday, afternoon at two o'clock the funeral services of Sister Sylvia P. Clark, who died at her residence in that place at 5.30 a. m., April 13th, were held in the Tabernacle, Bountiful, Counselor David Steker presiding. Addresses were delivered by Elder Jos. B. Noble, of West Bountiful, Apostle John Henry Smith and Elder Enoch Tripp, of this city. Between four and five hundred persons were present, some being from the adjacent wards, while others went from this city. The deceased was noted for her liberality, and integrity to the truth. She was the daughter of Sister Patry Sessions, many years a resident of the 17th Ward, but now of Bountiful, and was 63 years old at her demise. Elder Thos. F. Fisher, of South Bountiful, offered the opening prayer and Bishop Muir, of West Bountiful, the benediction. The dedicatory prayer was offered by Elder John Henry Smith. The singing, which was excellent, was conducted by the choir, led by Bro. Edward Thomas.
