Divorces for the Same Period, 22—Showing for Salt Lake County.

The records of the office of County Clerk James show that there were 122 marriage licenses issued during the month of April, and 22 divorce cases filed, making the ratio of divorces to marriages 1 to 5.54. The total number of cases filed in the district court during the month was 74, and it will be seen that the percentage of divorce cases is 3.36 per cent. Of the total number of cases filed, eight were impetuous, for which the county received no filing fee. Following is a comparative table showing the total number of cases filed, the number of divorce cases and the charity cases during the first four months of 1903 and 1904:

A FIELD DAY FOR UTAH METHODISTS

Visiting Clergymen, En Route to Los Angeles, Occupy Local Pulpits.

ONE LIKED TITHING SYSTEM.

Said He Wished the Methodist Church Had it, and the Thought Was Supported by Hearty "Amens."

The Methodists had a field day yesterday. The lateness of the trains from the east made appointments entirely uncertain, but the various evangelical pulpits were filled by visitors, whether the scheduled ones or not, and the home audiences enjoyed the change. Rev. Dr. C. E. Bacon of Indianapolis preached in the First Presbyterian pulpit, where there was only by a knowledge of God's ways and teachings can the world be redeemed. Said he: "All the plans of the philanthropic and scientific for the uplifting of man are vain unless these plans comprehend a knowledge of Deity."

Rev. R. J. Cook of Chattanooga preached in the First Methodist church where he said that the world's builders are the world's thinkers, and it is not the man who digs the mine and builds the railroad who does the most for humanity. There was a humbly before all these things, and the greatest builders have been the men who saw things and penetrated to the bottom of great questions. And the greatest of them all was the Apostle Paul. In a reference to the latter in his epistles, the speaker said that they could be cured by Christ alone, and that He alone can save society.

Rev. C. C. Townsend of Camden, N. Y., preached a sermon in the First Presbyterian church which was listened to with interest, and Rev. Dr. S. L. Belter of Buffalo, N. Y., spoke at the First Methodist church, contrasting the difference between the material and the spiritual. The evening meeting at the First Methodist church was largely attended and was characterized by considerable enthusiasm. Rev. Dr. N. C. Clappinger of Vincennes, Ind., opened with prayer, and Supp. Talt of the Utah mission extended a hearty welcome. He was followed by Rev. Dr. William Fielder of the Northern Minnesota conference, who spoke on the ministry of the church which he characterized as an heroic and heroic ministry. The speaker said he wished the Methodist church had a tithing system, and he closed with a chorus of "Amen!"
