The records of the office of County Clerk James show that there were 122 marriage licenses issued during the month of April, and 22 divorce cases filed, making the ratio of divorces to marriages 1 to 5.54. The total number of cases filed in the district court during the month was 74, and it will be seen that the percentage of divorce cases is 3.36 per cent. Of the total number of cases filed, eight were impecunios, for which the county received no filing fee.
