LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

High Council.—The members of the High Council are requested to meet at the Council House this evening at half-past seven o'clock. WM. W. TAYLOR, Clerk.

Home Mission.—The home missionaries of this State, will meet at the Council House on Wednesday evening the 28th inst., at seven o'clock.

Sunday Services.—Sunday Schools in session at 10 a. m.; Ward Meetings at 2 p. m., and at the usual evening hours. Home missionaries will be in attendance at the evening meetings.

The Social Pyramids.—Mr. Chas. W. Stayner will deliver his new and popular lecture on the Pyramids, Press and People, in the 18th Ward meeting-house, on Tuesday evening, at 7.30. The lecture will be given under the auspices of the Ward Mutual Improvement Association. The public are cordially invited to attend.

Children's Opera.—Professor Smyth is busy preparing the children's "Pinafore," for presentation at the Theatre during the holidays. "The Grand Duchess," which was undergoing rehearsals some time ago, at the hands of the juveniles, has been laid on the shelf for a time, as a task a little too grand for their tender years.

The Amateurs.—The Salt Lake Amateurs did not play in Ogden last night, as expected. Some misunderstanding occurred between them and Professor Sheldon, a prior lease of the Union Opera House. They will perform there to-night, however, and in Mendon, Cache County, Monday and Tuesday. Thence they make their tour of Cache Valley.

Intermediate Department.—The Intermediate Department of the Deseret University will open on Monday morning, in the Social Hall, forming a grade just below the lower classes in the University building. Heretofore, the intermediate classes have been held in the 18th Ward School-house, in connection with the Primary Department, but the increasing attendance demanding more room, the Social Hall will henceforth be occupied by the former, thus leaving the school in the 18th Ward exclusively for primary students. It should be well understood that all these various grades are parts of the Deseret University, though held in different buildings.

Water Matters.—Watermaster Charles H. Wilken requests the people of the 11th and 12th Wards who have not yet paid their share of the assessment for cleaning out the main ditch that supplies them with water, to meet him at 7 o'clock on Monday morning, at the 21st Ward School-house, prepared to do the work of cleaning said ditch and cutting it deeper. By so doing, the overflowing of the ditch in winter will be guarded against, another assessment will be obviated, and the people will be provided with water all during the winter.

Missionary Labors.—A letter from Elder James Millard, now laboring in Autauga County, Alabama, gives an interesting account of his experience as a missionary in that region. He was, at the date of writing, the 14th inst., in a place called Mountain Creek. He had been in that neighborhood since the 12th of June, had baptized one person and made other converts, who were on the eve of joining the Church. He felt well and alive to his duties, and speaks encouragingly of the prospects in his field, for further good work. Since his success began, he had met the usual spirit of persecution, but, on the other hand, had made friends of many good and honest people, and removed prejudice from their minds regarding the principles of the Gospel.

Ah Oon's Philosophy.—Ah Oon, the Mongolian opium house proprietor, expresses his contempt for a law that won't work like a two edged sword, against the whiskey drinker as well as the opium smoker. White man drinkes whiskey, all lightes, Chinaman smoke opium, finee fitee dolly. Libertes landes, damnee!" His enunciation here became so rapid, that our reporter was powerless to continue the translation.

District Court.—Proceedings in the Third District Court Saturday morning, Nov. 23, 1879, Chief Justice Hunter presiding: Ada Pratt, &c., vs. N. Groesbeck; until Monday, Dec. 1, allowed to answer.

People, etc., vs. Jas. Moray, murder; motion for new trial set for hearing Dec. 1.

L. B. Mattison vs. B. Y. Hampton; hearing on motion, noticed for to-day, continued until the 29th inst.

Brigham F. Grant vs. Susan Grant et al; motion for non-suit argued and submitted.

People, etc., vs. Henry Keyser et al; grand larceny; defendant Keyser arraigned. F. Hoffman appears as attorney. Defendant pleads not guilty, pro forma. Bond fixed at \$1,500.

A Reconciliation.—The following incident occurred in the 12th Ward, a day or two ago. A couple of small children, a boy and his sister had been quarrelling over some trifle and the boy had struck her. An older brother, coming along and hearing both sides of the story, proceeded to reconcile them, as follows: Older brother—"Now, Byron, you must say, I beg your pardon, sister; and then she must say, I accept it." Small boy rebels in silence. Sister weeps behind her apron. Older brother—"Come now, By, say, I beg your pardon." Byron—"with a desperate effort" "beg your pardon." Sister—"I expect it." Happiness prevails.

The Cattle Stealing.—Our District Court proceedings to-day, contain a minute of the cattle stealing case. Henry Keyser, Isaac Hunter and the man Hemmings have been indicted on a charge of grand larceny, that is for stealing 15 head of cattle belonging to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Keyser plead not guilty this morning and was released on bonds of \$1,500. The case may not come up for trial before the February term of the District Court.

The Opium Business.—Ah Oon the Chinaman fined \$50 yesterday for keeping an opium den and selling opium on the 18th inst., was up before Alderman Raleigh on the charge of committing a similar offence on the 19th inst. He plead guilty to the latter charge and was fined \$25. Another Chinaman, implicated was discharged from custody, and the remaining cases set for hearing Monday, at 10 a. m., when it is expected Justice Pyper will be able to occupy his accustomed place.

Two More.—The Grand Jury came into court yesterday afternoon, and presented two more indictments, found under the laws of the Territory. They immediately returned to their room to transact other business.

The Magician.—Hermann, the great illusionist, will appear at the Theatre next Tuesday and Wednesday nights.

Sunday School Review.—The 17th Ward Sunday School will hold its quarterly review to-morrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Educational Meeting.—The regular meeting of the County Educational Association will be held this evening, at the usual time and place.

Changed Quarters.—The Ogden Dispatch has moved into the Freeman building, on Fourth Street, and last evening came out in a new dress.

In Town.—Mr. J. A. West, president and business manager of the Ogden Junction publishing company, was in town to-day, and went home this afternoon.

B. A. Kenner, Esq., editor of the Junction is also paying the capital a brief visit.

A "Tight Squeeze."—This is the taking title of an entertaining book which relates the adventures of a gentleman who traveled as a common tramp, undertaking to go from New York to New Orleans in three weeks, without money. It was done for a heavy wage, and he related the incidents of his eventful journey. James Dwyer sells the work for fifty cents.

A Fatal Blow.—A man was driving a cow down the street west of the City Hall this morning, when, he claims, she turned on him as though to run at him with her horns. Picking up a rock as a missile, for defense, he threw it with such force, and struck the cow so squarely in the centre of the forehead, that she fell dead in her tracks. The stone used would not have weighed over seven or eight ounces.

Home-Made Millinery.—We were shown, this morning, a sample of home-made, straw, ladies' bonnets, manufactured at the millinery establishment of Mrs. Wilkinson, First South Street. It was on exhibition at the Fair in October, but through some mistake, was credited to another party. It is a most commendable piece of work. The straw was raised, colored, braided and sewed right here at home, and fashion experts declare the bonnet to be equal in design and finish to any similar article of ladies wear imported from abroad.

Stage Robbery.—The Junction, this morning, contains an account of a stage robbery that is said to have occurred at Pilgrim Station, 85 miles this side of Boise City, on last Tuesday night. About five p. m., two men rode up to the station, asked the hostler how long, before the stage would be there, and on his answering "in about two hours," proceeded to bind him. They then waited for the stage, which drove up about 7 o'clock, and presenting shotguns at the driver and the man passenger, who happened to be aboard, the highwaymen ordered them to throw up their hands and descend. They came down and were bound and the passenger robbed of \$90. The driver had no money on his person. On being expostulated with by their victims for robbing poor working men, the thieves relented a little and handed back a watch, but kept the money. They also allowed the men to keep their overcoats. They cooked and ate supper, fed their horses, robbed Wells Fargo's treasure box, partially loosened their prisoners, and bidding them "Good Morning," in true Dick Turpin style, mounted their horses and rode away.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

DUBLIN, 21.—At a meeting to-night, to denounce the arrest of Daly, Davitt and Kilian, about 5,000 persons were present. Edmund Dwyer Gray, liberal, home-rule member of Parliament presided. The following members of Parliament were present: Charles Stuart Parnell, Patrick James Smyth, George Harley Kirk, William Haggart, O'Leary and Joseph Gillis Biggar. The chairman considered the use of moderate language. Parnell moved that this meeting call upon Irishmen to pronounce by public meeting, the condemnation of the action of the government, which is unconstitutional and illegal, and thus show to the world that Irishmen are not to be intimidated by persecution. Parnell accused the government of entrapping Irishmen by means of paid spies. He advised Irishmen to be calm, because if they attempted to govern the government in illegal action, violence or disorder, then they would be doing what the butcher and destroyer of the poor Africans and Zulus desired them to do. He said: No earthly power could ever succeed against the united and determined efforts of Irishmen. In their struggle for their soil Irishmen would show Lord Beaconsfield that they know how to win a battle, and though they played against a man with loaded dice, their cause was the stronger. He said the land system was already tottering to its fall.

Biggar declared that Parnell was the leader of the Irish people.

After the demonstration was over, Parnell and Biggar started for the Balla meeting.

London, 21.—Some correspondence reports Fenianism again active. Great excitement was caused by a report that a street riot had occurred at Zephora, between republicans and internationalists, in which one person was killed and several wounded.

A dispatch from Paris says: Cavallier, editor of the socialist newspaper *Marcotte*, has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment and to pay a fine of 5,000 francs for libeling Gen. De Gallifet.

A Berlin correspondent reports that an explosion of gas occurred at Hamburg yesterday. Ten persons killed.
