# A GREAT METEOR SEEN.

# Falls in Sonora, Mexico, and Peopl

Denver, June 21 .- A special to the News from Tuscon, Ariz.; says: largest meteor ever seen in this part of the country fell between the pueblos of Los Molinas and Altar, in Sonora, Mexico, on June 11 at 10 o'clock in the morning. The meteor was seen by parties in Tuscon. Although the sun was high, the meteor illuminated the sky and seemed to have burst at the horizon. El Progreso, a Spanish paper, received at Tucson today, contains an article describing the shock at Altar and the terror of the people when the meteor fell. It struck the earth about forty miles from Altar, but the shock there was terrific and the people thought it was an earthquake.

### A Diver Visits the Schooner and Finds Gun Carriages.

New York, June 21.-A dispatch to the World from Burlington, Vt., says: J. G. Falcon, a diver, has visited the spot where the schooner Royal Savage, commanded by Gen. Benedict Arnold, was sunk in 1776 by the British. He found three gun carriages and about thirty cannon balls and shot. Two of the former will be sent to the Smith-sonian Institute at Washington and the other has been given to the city of Burlington. The relics were discovered In about thirty feet of water. The carriages are made of wood and iron, the former being now petrified.
