# THE PRESIDENT.

He and His Party Turn their  
Backs Upon Hospitable  
Madison.

Arrival at La Crosse, with Very  
Pleasing Incidents All  
Along.

Grand Entry Into St. Paul  
with the Most Unbounded  
Enthusiasm.

By Telegram to the News.

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 10.—Mrs. Cleve-  
land and Mrs. Vilas took carriages this  
morning and drove to the railroad sta-  
tion. The President and Colonel Vilas  
walked. There were some hundreds  
of people at the station, but there was  
no organized demonstration. Though  
the skies were bright, the atmosphere  
was chilly, and the steam heaters of the  
train were put in full blast.

LA CROSSE, Wis., Oct. 10.—When  
the President and his party reached here  
this afternoon a salute of twenty-  
one guns was fired. A great  
throng of people awaited their arrival  
and loudly cheered the visitors as they  
alighted. Meanwhile steam whistles  
of the mills and steamboats on the  
Mississippi, screamed their loudest.  
The station and the prominent build-  
ings of the city were tastefully decked  
with bunting. During the twenty  
minutes the train waited the party  
were escorted in carriages through the  
principal thoroughfares by the gov-  
ernor's guard. The entire population  
and a great number from a distance  
were on the streets.

OFF AGAIN.  
St. Paul, Oct. 10.—The special train  
containing the presidential party  
reached St. Paul exactly on time at  
2:30 this evening. The run from Mad-  
ison was perhaps the most enjoyable  
journey the party experienced since  
departure from Washington. All had  
been thoroughly rested and were in  
the best of health and spirits, while  
the weather for the greater part of the  
day was delightful. The region  
through which the train passed is one  
of the most fertile sections of the  
northwest. The people along the line  
and at the smaller stations were much  
excited by the greater part of the  
region seen earlier on the trip. They  
gathered at many points and swung  
their hats in friendly greeting. There  
were few attempts at decoration and  
the people seemed intent only on sat-  
isfying their desire to see the Presi-  
dent.

AT LA CROSSE,  
where the train tarried for twenty  
minutes, there was a little scene of  
demonstration which was highly  
praised by the recipients. Though  
there were 10,000 at the station, with  
twice as many more lining the streets  
of the town, the utmost order pre-  
vailed. The President's car was  
greeted by a band of musicians who  
played a grand march. The President  
and his party were escorted to the  
train by the mayor and a number of  
other officials. The President's car  
was the first to leave the station, and  
it was followed by the other cars of  
the party. The train left La Crosse  
at 10:15 p.m. for St. Paul.

BRIGHT SMILE  
The weather to-day has been bracing  
and frosty. The crowd is unparal-  
leled in the history of the city. The  
estimates place the number of  
strangers in the town at 50,000, and  
it is estimated that the President and  
his party will be here for a week.  
A large contingent gathered  
at the depot long before the Presi-  
dent's train was due, and waited pa-  
tiently. When the train pulled into  
the depot the reception committee  
boarded the President's car where  
they found the President and Mrs.  
Cleveland awaiting them. Escorted  
by the committee they came to the  
platform and proceeded down the stairs  
while the band played and the battery  
near the depot fired a presidential salute.  
As Mrs. Cleveland walked down three  
little girls stepped forward and pre-  
sented her with three lovely bouquets  
of pink roses. The party then en-  
tered carriages and was escorted to the  
hotel. The streets were  
literally jammed  
with the mass of humanity which  
surged after the carriages in great  
waves. At the Hotel Ryan the Presi-  
dent and party were escorted to the  
parlor and introduced to the committee  
who delivered a brief speech of wel-  
come which was responded to by the  
President in a strong, clear voice as  
follows:

I was reminded by the invitation I  
received to visit the State of Minne-  
sota and the City of St. Paul that a dis-  
tinguished statesman visiting here in  
1890 spoke of this place as the centre  
of the continent of North America, and  
stated his belief that the ultimate last  
seat of the government of the great  
continent would be found somewhere  
not far from the spot on which he  
stood at the head of navigation of  
the Mississippi River. At the time of  
Mr. Seward's visit the population of  
your state was 125,000 and that of St.  
Paul, its capital, was 10,000. I shall  
say, who, after 27 years have passed,  
find here a state containing nearly  
a million and a half

of people and its capital with a popu-  
lation nearly as great as that of the  
state itself in 1890. And while one is  
confronted with this immense increase  
is actually amazed by the fact that sixty  
per cent of more of the population of  
the state has been added in the last  
five years and that the population of  
St. Paul has more than trebled  
within the same time. Whether  
you are to have here the seat of govern-  
ment of this great continent or not,  
do not know, but those of us who  
are engaged in the business of govern-  
ment at Washington are certainly not  
at present preparing to move here.  
But the seat of those things which  
control government and make it great  
is fast moving this way. The centre  
of the country's population is rapidly  
moving westward, and the increase of  
wealth and production of this won-  
derful region are more than keeping  
pace with the movement in your direc-  
tion of the nation's population.

THE PRESIDENT  
then spoke at some length in praise of  
the city and state and concluded as  
follows:

My visit to you being a social one,  
and trusting that we have a sort of  
friendly feeling for each other, I want  
to say to you a reason why I am  
particularly and personally interested  
in St. Paul and its people. Some  
years ago, a young girl dwelt among  
you and went to school. She has  
grown up to be a woman and is now  
wife. If any one thinks a Presi-  
dent ought not to mention things  
of this sort in public, I hope for  
her sake to live in St. Paul, for I  
don't want to shock anybody. I thank  
the good people of this city be-  
cause they neither married nor spoiled  
my wife (laugh and applause) and  
when I tell them that she is more to  
me than all earthly honors and distinc-  
tion, you may be sure that her pleasant  
recollection of her school days will be  
reinforced by the no less

PLEASING MEMORY  
of our present visit, and thus will our  
present interest in St. Paul and its  
kind citizens be increased and perpetu-  
ated.

When the speech-making concluded  
the party went to dinner in a private  
room, after which they retired to their  
apartments to prepare for the evening  
of the evening.
