

SCANDINAVIAN RALLY LAST NIGHT

Big Turnout at Odeon Hall With Speeches, Music and Singing.

SENATOR SMOOT'S ADDRESS.

Martin Christopherson, J. M. Sjødahl, C. M. Nielsen, Jos. Sharp and John C. Mackay Among Speakers.

At Odeon hall last night the Scandinavian people turned out for a rally and sociable that in both respects was an entire success.

The evening was meant to be a Republican gathering, and in the nature of a tribute to Senator Smoot, whose mother is of Norwegian birth.

There were several speakers, some of whom spoke in the northern tongues and roused the enthusiasm of those present to a high pitch.

Senator Smoot was greeted by an ovation when he arose to speak as was also John C. Mackay, who has been much opposed as a candidate for county clerk because of his stand in behalf of the people of the valley in their contest over the smoke problem.

A. C. Nelson, candidate for state superintendent of schools, Mrs. Margaret Zane Witcher, candidate for county clerk, Joseph Sharp, candidate for sheriff, Judge M. L. Ritchie and Hiram Smith were among the prominent men of public life who were present.

Axel Steele presided, and introduced Martin Christopherson as the first speaker. Mr. Christopherson spoke in Norwegian and was much applauded, after which J. M. Sjødahl spoke in the Swedish tongue, and C. M. Nielsen in Norwegian. Joseph Sharp spoke of the Republican platform and its guarantee of a square deal to all. Mr. Sjødahl's theme was the influence of prominent churchmen upon the political institutions of the country, and he quoted from American history in substantiation of the assertion that we owe the principles of liberty upon which our government institutions rest to religious influences.

He then pointed out the difference between the interference in politics by a church organization and the political activity of church men who are citizens and as such have a political duty to perform. He claimed that present local conditions are such that church members must stand together against an un-American foe that attacks the Church and therefore has forfeited its right to homestead under the beautiful banner of equality and liberty under the law.

John C. Mackay referred to the slanderous campaign made against him in certain circles and referred to the hoodlums told in the campaign literature and speeches. The record of the county administration he reviewed, showing that such a record in office deserved continuance through another.

C. M. Nielsen spoke of the reasons why he had left the ranks of the Democratic party, and explained some of the principles on which the two parties differ. He made several witty remarks on local conditions and was loudly cheered.

SENATOR SMOOT.

Senator Smoot, who was the principal speaker of the evening, went into political affairs at length. Of his mother, he told how she left Norway, and came to Utah across the plains, and that to her he owed everything good that has come into his life, and he felt sure that his hearers had learned their lessons in patriotism, where he learned his, at his mother's knee.

"Under the flag of this country," he said, "one man is equal to another, and all that the people ask is that their rights shall not be taken from them by any clique of men on earth. The principles of the Republican party are such that anyone might be proud of them, and it is to the best interests of the people here that those principles be put into practice."

He reviewed the work of the federal office holders in Utah, stating that he felt a keen sense of pride in the splendid shape that these offices were reported to Washington after each inspection.

The charge that the machine dictated the gubernatorial nomination, Senator Smoot ridiculed, declaring that the day before the convention no one could say who would be nominated.

PEACE WITH HONOR.

"I want peace in Utah," continued the senator. "But I want peace with honor. Here is an appeal made to defeat the federal bunch for the sake of peace. That peace would come quickly enough if men sacrificed their manhood and crawled on their knees to Tom Kearns to lick his boots. The Mormons would then be called a good set of people."

"Our manhood is as dear to us as it is to anybody on earth, and when they say they will take our liberties away then I say they must be equal to the task. I for one will not lay my head on the block as long as I can defend myself. We know what this fight is. It is first for our homes and for our liberty."

"It is for clean government as in the past and every man on an equal footing. That is our platform. Is that what they contemptuously sneer at as 'Smoothism'?"

EQUAL RIGHTS.

"Republican means equal rights with one another, and what is a man's religion, and hope to God that I am big and broad enough to represent all the people of Utah in the United States senate. I intend to do so and any man who has his religion what it may who comes to me with any enterprise for the good of my state, will receive my assistance to the utmost. If Tom Kearns himself came to me with a laudable enterprise which would assist Utah he would have my support."

"Now, it has been stated that there would have been no 'American' party if it had not been for Reed Smoot. This is telling an untruth in a most underhanded manner. Smoot is only an incident and the war was not really on him and would not have stopped with him by any means."

"It is due to the party with which I stand, the party of freedom and liberty that I received a fair hearing and having been found innocent, was not permitted to suffer for false charges."

"The Republican party protects the interests of all. It especially protects your interests in the state and the Democratic platform calls for the placing on the free list of every article in the production of which is bound up the welfare of the state."

At the close of Senator Smoot's speech, dancing was indulged in. A pleasing feature of the evening was the singing of the Norwegian glee club under the direction of Prof. Anthon Pederson. The meeting concluded with the entire assembly arising and singing "America."

N. L. MORRIS TALKS TO NON-PARTISANS

Big Crowd Assembles at Sixteenth Ward Amusement Hall And Applauds Speakers.

RIGHT TO DEFEND PEOPLE.

Claims He Seeks No Other Reward Than the Discharge of Duty in Unmasking Politicians.

To express their right as members of the Church to rally to its defense in an hour of trial and attack, and to express their right as individuals to carry on their civic duties without forfeiting the right of self-defense, a large outpouring of people assembled at the Sixteenth ward amusement hall last night to attend a nonpartisan meeting.

Col. George B. Squires, president, introduced as the speakers of the evening, H. C. Iverson and Nephil L. Morris, who considered the "American" party crusade, and its effect if carried to its logical conclusions. Mrs. Emma Ramsey-Morris, beautiful, rendered the "Flag Without a Stain," after Mr. Iverson had completed his speech, the audience following the number by joining in the singing of "America."

Mr. Iverson spoke of the "American" record in office, of the cost of improvements carried on under his regime, and of the general record for extravagance it has made.

"Because I am a member of the priesthood of the Latter-day Saints," said Mr. Morris, after being introduced amid a storm of applause, "I am not supposed to be able to talk to speak, or to defend myself or my people from the scurrilous and vilifying attacks of this lying organ, but I have determined to speak as I feel without reference to the press or to the opposition."

"I have met more or less abuse, much of which I have been present at meetings—one of them in this same hall—and heard, and I have enjoyed every bit of it. I have heard these things said about myself, because I have done what I conceive to be my duty, and yet you can't name the office that I want, or would have."

RIGHT OF DEFENSE.

"I claim the right to defend myself and my people against the abusive attacks of an unscrupulous opposition, and that I am here to do, seeking no other reward, than the discharge of my duty."

"The Smoot investigation was held by a congressional committee as a result of the work of this man Kearns and his advisers, and after it was over the Mormons are still alive, and Mr. Smoot came out of it with unblemished character. I wonder if Mr. Kearns, or Mr. Cannon, who did so much to bring that investigation about, would have

been able to stand such a searching investigation of their private lives and lives through it as Senator Reed Smoot did."

"I propose to go right on speaking my mind regardless of the fact that every time a Mormon opens his mouth or dares to lift his voice in defense of himself or his religion, a howl is raised that can be heard throughout the land."

ATTACKS ON CHURCH.

The Tribune editorial of October 11 was read, and the speaker declared that after such a lampoon on the Mormon priesthood as that there obviously could be no merit to the claim that the Tribune is not attacking the Church, since to destroy the priesthood of the Church would be to destroy the very fabric of the Church.

The speaker referred to the recent utterances of B. H. Roberts in this campaign, declaring his opposition of the view taken by Mr. Roberts. "It is with feelings of deepest regret," he said, "that I am forced to realize the time has passed when this may be termed a political fight—it is now a matter of self-defense, by men and women who have a right to defend themselves and their faith."

By means of a circular sheet, the Tribune would not have been permitted to exist in any other community. It has slandered you and me, it has slandered our mothers and our fathers.

"There are thousands of men and women in the state who are not Mormons, but who are sick and tired of this form of persecution, and they will be with us in tomorrow's election, because they realize the fact that this party and its mouthpiece is not making a fight for a principle, but is conducting a campaign of unwarranted abuse."

"This is a home, and there explain to the children that he loved them with great and abiding love, but he would like to get a chance to kill their parents."

"If this party got into control in the state, what chance would a Mormon have in it? Do you think it is the time to hand over the county to them? Remember, this is the first step. If they get control of this county, they will get control of others, and then of the governor, and the inevitable result, where would the Mormons be?"

"The Tribune long ago made the issue, and I am thankful that it did, but I wish it had announced who our enemy was sooner. It did this only two days ago when it said that the Republicans were the only ones the American party need consider as a serious enemy."

"I claim, for all these reasons, that the time has passed when the fight is a political contest, and that it has become a matter of self-defense, and the only way the Mormon people can defend themselves against the common enemy, is to vote the Republican ticket."

In closing Mr. Morris paid a tribute to the work of the congressional delegation at Washington and to the abilities of William Spry, Republican candidate for governor. "The duty of the Mormon people," he said, "is to adopt the only means at hand for their defense in this campaign—namely, to vote the Republican ticket at the polls tomorrow."

SPANISH SWINDLE AGAIN

Clever Gang Defrauding People in This Country Out of Large Sums—Public Warned.

The so-called Spanish swindle has been revived and this time it appears under a new scheme. It was recalled that several years ago it took the form of hidden treasure and that several residents of Utah and Idaho were worked up to the point of investigating and investing some preliminary money in the proposition which bore all the earmarks of probability. In the hopes of getting some easy money, much money, in fact, some parties in Pocatello sent for plans and specifications which were to show where some old Spanish treasure was buried. The reason, that those who were giving the information could not themselves come was, according to the letter, that they were in prison in Spain.

The secret was for sale and some cash was asked and then a division of the land on an equitable basis would follow. The correspondence was carried on from Barcelona, Spain. Subsequent investigation showed that the swindlers evidently had accomplices in the United States, and the names of prominent and likely victims were furnished from every state in the Union.

Now comes a circular letter mailed by a New York firm to all bankers in Salt Lake asking that the greatest possible publicity be given to the revival of the swindle in a different form so that the public be warned. Here is the circular:

"For quite a number of years a gang of clever swindlers in Spain has been more or less successful in defrauding people in this country out of large sums of money. The daily papers have exposed the scheme from time to time,

but it would appear that the swindlers nevertheless succeed in finding clever girls exposed to this country. Miss A. Balked and wrote the Spanish minister. He has just written her that she is very lucky to have secured the clutches of a band of swindlers."

Miss A. M. A., a school teacher of this city, today made public that she had been in correspondence with a band of Spanish swindlers, who claim to have a minor heir, and a valuable estate, looking for a guardian.

"The heir always bears the name of the person to whom they write and is supposed to be a distant relative. Miss A. became interested in the pitiful story told, and entered into correspondence with 'P. Lopez,' who had charge of the child. When he wrote that \$201 would

be necessary for legal expenses and the girl's expenses to this country, Miss A. balked and wrote the Spanish minister. He has just written her that she is very lucky to have secured the clutches of a band of swindlers."
