The United States Supreme Court gave judgment in the Lucy Armstrong murder case in Kentucky, which was taken to the United States Circuit Court of the district under the clvil rights bill of 1866, the murdered woman and two of the witnessess having been hegroes and as such debarred the right to testify in the courts of the state of Kentucky. The decision of the Supreme Court is that the case does not come within the provisions of

the civil rights act, and that the Circuit Court had not jurisdiction of the crime of murder committed in the ocean race with the yatchs in the district of Kentucky, merely Dreadnought, Vesta, and Comet, because two persons who witnessed the murder were citizens of the African race, and for that reason incompetent by the law of Ken-tucky to testify in the courts of that state.
