MUDDLE OVER TRACKS.  
Harriman Line Does Not Want Bamberger to Use Its Right of Way.

Representatives of the Oregon Short Line railroad and the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad, who are petitioning to lay separate tracks on Third West street between South Temple and Fourth South streets appeared before the council last night. On account of two tracks being on the street now, the council objected to having four laid on the street. It was proposed to allow both companies to operate over one track. Simon Bamberger, manager of the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad, was willing to agree to this, but George H. Smith, counsel for the Harriman line, refused to entertain the proposition. After considerable debate it was decided not to report on the matter until next week in order to give the members of the council a chance to go over the ground.

## INVESTIGATION SERVES PURPOSE

Responsibility for Loss of Tools Not Fixed, but Lessons Are Learned.

### SOME PAYROLLS ARE MISSING

Only Receipts Board Has for Expenditures Are Not to Be Found—Successor Not Named.

The committee of teachers and school work of the board of education completed its investigation yesterday as to the tools, valued at \$512, which have been taken from the manual training department. Although the committee was unable to fix the responsibility the investigation served its purpose.

"The committee did not hold the investigation," said Mat Thomas, of the board of education, "to find some person guilty. It was called primarily to see what could be done to avoid the loss of any tools. I think that the losses sustained were small for the number of tools that the schools handle each year, but next year I believe the loss will be even less, because the teachers in charge of the tools will be more careful than ever."

When the committee called for the pay rolls the different departments it developed that a large blanket sheet was used, the lists and amounts of the different departments being placed on the sheet with a place for the signature of the employee. These sheets were sent out together with the vouchers to the different heads of the departments. When the money was paid out the heads of the departments were supposed to return them, as this was the only receipt the board had for the expenditure. About 12 of the sheets had been turned in yesterday by J. M. Bridwell, superintendent of buildings. It is alleged by the clerk of the board, and two are still missing. The committee recommended that the finance committee look into the matter.

There was no meeting last night of the board of education to name a successor to fill the vacancy created by the death of Joseph Orndorfer as Judge H. P. Henderson was not ready to make a recommendation. A meeting will be held at 7:30 Tuesday night.

### NELSON STATES HIS VIEW.

Interpretation of House Bill 92 Is Rendered to City Superintendent.

A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of schools, has given his interpretation of house bill No. 92, which on the face would indicate that graduates of the higher institutions would be debarred from securing teaching certificates unless courses in psychology and history of education have been taken. Mr. Nelson sent the following outline of his views to D. H. Christensen at the latter's request:

"I have before me your communication of this date, in which you submit the question:

"Is a graduate of the University of Utah, or a Harvard graduate, for that matter, who has had on temporary certification two years' successful experience, eligible after 1911 to life certification, if he has a course in psychology and history of education, or sustains the prescribed examination in these subjects?"

In reply permit me to say that the section of law to which you call attention applies to applicants who (after 1911) have the examination for county teacher's certificate. Evidently the intent of the law is to raise the standard of the qualification through written examination. As the requirements of law for other certificates and diplomas were above four years' high school education or its equivalent, including psychology and history of education before the enactment of this measure, I am of the opinion that this section of law refers to the standard required for county certificates only and therefore a graduate from the University of Utah or from any other university or college of reputable standing who might be an applicant for a state certificate or diploma after having had two years' successful teaching experience in the schools of this state, would not be required to pass an examination in psychology or history of education, or any other subject, unless such requirement should be made by the state board of education under authority of law other than that conveyed in this section quoted."
