OLD residents have probably noticed that there is less snow in the mountains around this valley this summer than has been known any previous summer since the settlement of this valley. Considerable snow fell last Winter, and many thought there would be high water in the streams this Spring and Summer, but during no season for years past have the rivers and creeks been so low in June as they were in that month of this year. The evaporation, since warm weather commenced in the Spring, has been excessive. We think this is partly due to the prevalence of Southerly winds.
