

Dedication of the Site for the Temple at Logan.

LOGAN, May 18.

The ground site for the proposed Temple to be built at Logan was selected yesterday by the First Presidency and Twelve and surveyed by Elder Jesse W. Fox, who was assisted by James H. Martineau, the Architect Truman O. Angell, and others. The site is most beautifully situated on a piece of table land immediately east of the city, commanding a delightful view of the celebrated valley of Cache.

To-day, at precisely twelve m. o'clock, the ground was broken at the south-east corner of the site. Elder Orson Pratt, kneeling near the broken ground and surrounded by several prominent elders and a large number of people, then offered the dedicatory prayer, after which remarks were made by President Young and Elder John Taylor. Playing into the Hands of a Greedy Ring.

Another sensational dispatch, evolved by the Salt Lake correspondent of the New York Herald, represents Utah in a state of incipient rebellion. Great excitement is said to prevail among the Gentile population, who are making active preparations for an exodus. Brigham Young is the chief of the Mormon rebellion, and he is represented as very defiant. Now it happens that a special correspondent of the Bee, Mr. T. B. Hall, has been in Salt Lake City for the past two weeks. He was present at the Mormon Tabernacle during the delivery of Brigham Young's sermon, which the New York Herald man denounces as disloyal and rebellious, but which Mr. Hall, who is an ardent Methodist, did not consider the least objectionable. Mr. Hall called on Brigham Young last Tuesday to ascertain his sentiments towards the national government, and he represents his interview with the Mormon leader as follows—

Reporter—Mr. Young, what do you expect will be President Hayes' Mormon policy?

Brigham Young—I have no idea, but think he will deal fairly and not try to carry water on both shoulders, as such men generally get wet.

Reporter—What is your opinion in regard to the proposed disintegration of your Territory by annexing its parts to the adjoining States and Territories?

Brigham Young—I think it is all talk, a plan devised by some in order to get our people to pay some of their indebtedness. Don't think there is anything in it?

Reporter—What is the disposition of your people toward the present Territorial officers, particularly Governor Emery?

Brigham Young—We are well satisfied with our present governor.

Reporter—Is there any disposition among your people to resist the national authorities in the execution of the laws?

Brigham Young—Our people are peaceable and law-abiding, and it would take a great deal of oppression and persecution to arouse them to resistance.

Now, if Brigham Young was really meditating the fool-hardy rebellion which the New York Herald correspondent wants the country to believe, he certainly would have expressed dissatisfaction with the existing Territorial government, even if for no better reason than to pave the way for a tangible excuse for a revolt. On the other hand, it is more plausible to assume that the correspondent of the Herald is trying to play into the hands of a ring that expects to secure plunder by drawing troops now stationed elsewhere into Utah. —Omaha Bee, May 16.
