### TRAVELING IN AFRICA.

THE QUICKEST TRIP ACROSS THE DARK CONTINENT.

The twelfth journey across Africa from sea to sea has been made by Captain Trivier. He has apparently missed nothing to geographical discovery, for his route from the coast has been traversed by earlier explorers. He did not leave the beaten path, as he had promised to do, but he had planned to do so. The interesting questions whether Lake Landi is the gathering place where all the upper waters of the Congo meet to issue from the lake as the Congo proper, and whether the Lukaya river, the supposed outlet of Lake Tanganyika, empties into Landi. His journey is noteworthy, however, as the quickest trip yet made across Africa. Starting from the west coast at the Congo, he struck the river at Stanley Pool, and by means of steamer to Stanley Falls and on to Lake Tanganyika, which he reached in 1895. He crossed the Quilimane, along the water path between the Congo and the Zambezi, in fourteen months. Lena, who in 1894 made gradually the same journey that Trivier has just completed, was seventeen months on the way. Livingstone was twenty-two months on his journey from London to Quilimane, and all the other famous African travelers, Stanley, Cameron, Macleod, Arnot, Wissman, Glasper, and Serpa Pinto were from sixteen months to more than three years.

Trivier's journey demonstrates not only the improved facilities for traveling, but also Africa, but also the fact that a man may now cross the continent without losing touch with civilization. From every important point along the French traveler's route he was able to send letters home, and his progress was more than two-thirds of the journey was known in Europe before he himself emerged on the shores of the Indian ocean. This is a great advance on the conditions of Africa on travel only ten years ago, when explorers who ventured no further inland than Lake Tanganyika were not entirely to view for more than a year.—N. Y. Sun.

### NEW MEXICO.

AN IMPORTANT "STRIKE" NEAR KINGSFORD—OTHER FINDS.

What is believed to be a very important strike has been made about eight miles north of Kingsford, in Sierra county. The ore is said to be as rich as that found in the Cornish, which was struck by the late Mr. Kingsford. A few years ago a few ore bodies in the area were discovered at Kingsford or near Kingsford. The discovery is all the more important because it has every appearance of being a true fissure vein. Hitherto the rich strikes made in this district have usually been in line, and have been pocket formations of greater or less extent. This vein is on a contact between porphyry and granite, which is itself a good indication. The location of the mine is favorable, being on a formation clearly traceable to the Tumbler and Virginian, two of the important porphyries of this section. Its discovery seems to indicate that there may be another very important mining district developed north of Kingsford besides the North Potosi district, from which a large amount of very rich mineral has been taken. The development of the new strike will be pushed as rapidly as possible, to determine whether the ore is uniformly of high grade. The ore is silver, but runs well gold. A mill will be put up by the owners of the mine to test the ore.

### SIAM'S RAILWAYS.

The Siam government has decided to construct all railways of standard gauge, namely, 4 feet 8 1/2 inches. The projected railway east from Bangkok to the Mekong River, about 400 miles long, has been favorably launched. Sir Andrew Clarke's syndicate offered to find half the capital and construct the line, charging 40 per cent commission on the cost price. The first section of fifty-five miles to Patheingyi will be begun immediately. Half the capital will be found by Siam and the company will be formed under the name of the Siam Railway Co., Ltd.

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
