For these reasons, as we have no votes to offer, we should give our earnest and conscientious support to the republican party, whose chosen leader is one of the ablest statesmen our country can boast, and who, if elected, will, with the noble woman of his family circle, honor the White House and the highest office in the gift of the American people.
