### Acquiring Danish West Indies.

New York, Jan. 20 .--- A special to the Times from Washington says: The department of state will not take up, at present, the suggestion that negotiations be resumed with Denmark for the acquisition of the Danish West Indies. Talk about negotiations is said to be premature, warranted only by the fact that certain business men in New York regard it as desirable that Denmark be again approached on the sub-

No opportunity will be afforded to anybody who aspires to carry on negotiations for the purpose of enjoying a commission from the sale. It is felt quite safe to leave the islands in Denmark's hands, as no foreign power would undertake to secure them with-out the approval of the United States. It is known that the islands are a burden to Denmark, but it is also feit that Congress would not just yet sanction a purchase of them.

### Perilous Trip of Mail Carrier.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—A special to the Record from Seattle, Wash., says: Advices from Dawson report that United States Mail Carrier Holcombe has arrived at Eagle from Valdes, completing the first winter trip as carrier of government mail from the seat of the Yukon, a distance of 450 miles.

# SERVES A NOTICE UPON THE MAYOR Just Ten Days Water and Electrical Power Co Directo Flow at Narrows Vet Remain

Diverts Flow at Narrows.

ACTION WAS NO SU RPRISE

### Effect the Taking of the Water Has Upon the City-Lessens the Pressure.

On Thursday of this week the Salt Lake City Water and Electrical Power company, of which Allan G. Lamson is president and manager, turned the city's water out of the Jordan river at the old Narrows dam into the Salt Lake and Utah canal, permitting it to flow back into the Jordan and Salt Lake City canal, thus returning it into the channel which brings it into the city after it has passed over the power wheels of the Lamson company. This action on the part of Mr. Lam-

son created no particular surprise among city officials and is in accordance with the terms of a notice of appropriation filed by Lamson some time ago, and which is being contested by the city in the courts.

Yesterday afternoon the water and electrical power company served the following notice upon Mayor Thompson:

"We desire to notify you,as the executive of Salt Lake City, that in accordance with our appropriation heretofore made, we have constructed a flume connecting our water wheels with the canal owned by Salt Lake City and known as the Jordan and Salt Lake City canal, and are prepared to use all water the City of Salt Lake Is entitled to flow through said Jordan and Salt Lake City canal past the point where our flume connects with said canal. It is our in-tention to place the City of Salt Lake in exactly the same position as to the delivery of water in its canal at and below the point where our flume connects with the canal as though such water had been flowed down the canal from its headgate to said point. And, therefore, we now notify you that we will at all times, upon the demand of the person delegated by the city to control the supply of water flowing in said can-al, turn into said canal from our flume all water which the City of Sait Lake is entitled to use through said canal, leaving the question of determination of such amount to the city itself.
