CONDENSED MILK FACTORY. City Council Session - Capid's Busy Week-Beef Cattle Shipments. Special Correspondence.

Logan, March 19 .- The proposed con-

densed milk factory is practically assured. The sum of \$60,000 will be required to capitalize the institution and of this amount \$45,600 has already been obtained. Mayor Hansen, who has the factory in hand, and who will be the factory in hand, and who will be the general manager of the institution, is one of the heaviest stockholders, and his creameries located in and adjacent to Logan will be merged into the new enterprise, in order that the foundation for a good supply of milk may be as-sured. The buildings will be erected luring the coming summer, and it is hoped to have the factory in condition to begin work by Oct. 1. The plant's capacity will be 100,000 pounds of milk per day, and as none but the purest and best milk will be used, one-third more than the present price will be paid for the liquid. The creamerles pay r the liquid. The creamerles pay om 70 to 90 cents per hundred pounds whereas for condensed milk uses, from \$1.00 to \$1.25 will be paid. It is necessary that the utmost cleanliness be ob pay for their extra pains in this respect. Logan is an ideal place for the fac tory, as we have here vast pasturage
