His road work and stiff gym-nasium exercises will be started just as soon as he reaches his training camp, which will be the same one that he used while training for Corbett last summer. Jack Munroe has lost little time since he outpointed Sharkey at Philadelphia. He has got the theaterical bee, and the miner and his manager intend to play it as long as it will last. Munroe figures that it is easy money, still, while pick-ing up easy sheckels he is giving eight lively boxing rounds every day, which incidentally keeps him in pretty good trim.
