WASHINGTON, 16.—A memorial was presented in the Senate to-day by Plumb, being a concurrent resolution of the legislature of Kansas, praying that Congress provide for the rights of way for railroads through the Indian Territory. Referred

Mr. Gladstone's Cabinet. Dublin, 16.—The corporation of Dablin vesterday adopted resolutions demanding Home Rule for Ireland, and expressing reliance in Mr. Glwdstone's promises and ability to secure it. Mr. Mitchal Davitt supported the resolu-tions, and said there were good grounds for hope that Gladstone would settle the Home Rule question as he settled the church question in Ireland. Mr. John Dillon said: "We are now on the eve of achieving a National Parliament for Ireland. We will only accept the completest form of Home

accept the completest form of Home Rule. When we have that, then I and other Irish extremeists will join hands with Englishmen." Three hundred and fifty-nine Presby-

terian congregations in Ireland, num-bering altogether 328,100 persons, have adopted resolutions denouncing the project of establishing Home Rule. London, 16.—Gladatone is sending letters of inquiry to all sorts and con-ditions of Irishmen, probably includ-ing Parcellice ng Parnellites.
