LOCAL BRIEFS.

Back on the Old Route—The street cars are running once more on North Temple street west of Main.

Rates on the Increase—Local milling men say that of late rates have increased in this city, having been brought in from lower altitudes in crated coals. However, reports of comparatively recent times, this form of rodent was unknown in Salt Lake.

League Invites Delegates—Silas Cook, president of the American League of Municipalities, sent an invitation to the city council last night to send delegates to the next annual convention. It will be held in Montreal, on August 25, 26, and 27.

New Battery Equipment—Foreman G. W. Morrison of the government arsenal shops at San Antonio, Tex., is in the city at the instance of Colonel Clark of the Ordnance corps to give Captain W. C. Webb instructions relative to maintenance of the new battery equipment.

Forgery is Charged—J. A. Wolfe was arrested and lodged in the county jail last night on a charge of forgery. Wolfe is accused of having forged the name of the Rose-Clark Fruit company to a check for \$77, and securing funds on the worthless check from Ben Harman of the Horseshoe saloon.

Quartet to Begin Practice—Mrs. H. T. Schraven of Elv, Nev., arrived last night on the Utah central, passing through the city, to compete for the grand prize at the Seattle Blendedfruit in August. The quartet is composed of Emily Larson, Lottie Owen, first and second sopranos; Mrs. Schraven and Emma J. Sanders, first and second alto.

Cars Start Downtown—Beginning with today, the Emerygrader Canyon Railroad company will send one of its cars daily downtown over Second South street to Main, and around the First South street loop, passing the Kenyon corner at 2 p. m. The canyon cars are now running up the switch-back and over the mountain to the quarry, a trip of 10 miles.

Greek Meets Greek With Stick—Becoming angered at one of his countrymen, Mike Grek, a Greek shopkeeper, last night attacked him with a sharp-pointed stick as a weapon. Before Chapman could be restrained he had jabbed the stick into the face of the victim of his rage, several times. He was arrested by Patrolman J. A. Brown, and held in custody without bail.

Patrolman Kelly Retires—After four years' service as patrolman in the police department, F. C. Kelly tendered his resignation to Chief Barry yesterday afternoon, and was relieved from duty last night. Mr. Kelly will return to his former trade as ironworker. During his service on the force Kelly proved himself to be an efficient and competent officer and made a good record.

Warren Smith, secretary of the association. The Hawkeyes will picnic next Saturday at Liberty park where plans will be considered for the entertainment of the entertainment of veterans.

One of the Drawbacks—Strenuous objection is being made against the compulsory use by prisoners of stationery marked "State Prison." Letters thus marked are sent into communities where it is often not known that persons resident or known there are in confinement, and the appearance of envelopes thus marked is the occasion of mortification to many relatives and friends. The matter is likely to be brought before the governor.

Invited to Tunnel Opening—Governor William Spry received an invitation to attend the opening of the Gunnison tunnel at Montrose, Colo., on Sept. 28. This tunnel was constructed under the government reclamation service and it has taken about four years to complete it. The entire project cost about \$5,000,000, and will reclaim part of the Uncompahgre valley. It is probable that Governor Spry will be able to attend the ceremonies.

Victory Takes Maiden Trip—A new gasoline launch named "Victory," owned by W. H. Parker, made its first trip about the lake yesterday. Although a heavy sea was running at the start and greatly increased during the trip, the pretty little boat behaved splendidly, and returned to Saltair in fine shape. Mr. Parker did most of the work himself, and is justly proud of the dainty little craft, which is a creditable addition to the group of launches.

GOV. SPRY'S VIEW OF INCOME TAX

Thinks the Proposed Amendment Will Not Meet With Great Favor in Utah.

HE IS NOT AN ADVOCATE OF IT

Before People Once Before and Does Not Believe Those of This State Will Change Their Minds.

New York, July 20.—In order to ascertain sentiment in the various states of the Union on the question of amending the federal Constitution so as to provide Congress with the authority to levy an income tax, a New York newspaper has sent telegrams to the governors of the several states, or 23 chief executives who have replied, 15 were in favor of the income tax proposition; seven were non-committal, or had not sounded public or legislative sentiment, and one opposed.

Governors of the following states replied to the effect that their state legislatures would probably ratify the proposed income tax amendment: Florida, Montana, Nevada, Colorado, Idaho, Mississippi, Kansas, Indiana, North Dakota, Minnesota, Virginia, Oklahoma, Texas, Kentucky, Iowa.

The non-committal replies were from Georgia, Illinois, Rhode Island, Wyoming, Missouri, Oregon and Washington. In Utah only, however, was it ascertained that the amendment would be rejected. William Spry of that state, replied:

"I am inclined to think that the income tax amendment will not meet with great favor in Utah. The matter has been before the people of the nation once before, and as I remember it, did not meet with special favor. Because of this, I have no reason to believe that the people of Utah will change their minds. Personally, I am not an advocate of the idea."

WHAT GOV. HASKELL SAYS.

"I compliment the president for having gone far enough in the waste basket of his predecessor and found a sensible proposition. That is an Oklahoma proposition, and the voters will have to decide on it. I am sure on their position of 14 months ago."
