ESCAPE FROM COUNTY JAIL. Three Prisoners Crawl Out Through Hole in Wall-Two Recaptured.

Manti, Sanpete Co., May 8,-- A jailbreak and the escape of three prisoners from the county bastile at 7:30 last evening, says a Herald special, caused great excitement. Two of the fugitives were captured shortly after their escape, and Sheriff John Knudsen and a posse are hot on the trail of the third; but in spite of this the wildest rumors are afloat, especially as two of the pris-oners were in jali on the charge of horse stealing and are considered by many to be desperate characters. Just before dark the alarm was given

that the county jail had been broken and that three prisoners had escaped. This, on investigation, proved to be true. The men while in the corridor of the jail, before they were put into their cells for the night, managed to remove a number of brick from the wall, making a hole large enough to crawl through.

Samuel Richards, one of the fugitives, was caught by a deputy sheriff before he had escaped from the city. It is now thought that he would have prejudice his case. He was placed jall for two years on the charge of housebreaking, the charge coming from Aagaard & Sons, merchants of Fountain Green. He was sentenced in the district court in January.

The other two are considered to be a different class of men. They are William Moore of Moab, and his companion, named Steele, who are under suspicion of having been mixed up in a number of horse stealing scrapes in the southern part of the state,

Moore was captured within an hour after the alarm was given. He was found in the burhes near the electric light plant a mile above the city in the canyon. He was captured by City Marshal Bryant Harmon. He was not armed at the time of his capture and made no resistance. He was brought back and securely looked up to a cell made no resistance. He was brought back and securely locked up in a cell

for the night.
Steele, Moore's companion, was more Steele, Moore's companion, was more fortunate. Sheriff Knudsen, all his deputies and a large posse of citizens were out after the fugitive, but so far he has escaped recapture.

The first heard here of Moore and Steele was from San Juan county. Moore was arrested there on the charge

of horse steeling, but escaped on some defect in the information. He was afterwards arrested in Grand county on another charge of horse stealing and held to appear for trial in Grand coun-ty. He failed to appear for trial at ty. He failed to appear for trial at the time specified and his bond was ordered forfeited. A number of prominent men of Moab were on the bond and they are now anxious as to the final outcome. Moore is originally from

After Moore had failed to appear for trial in Grand county a bench war-rant was issued by the judge and placed in the hands of Deputy Sherift Turner of that county. In company with another deputy whose name was not learned Turner started in pursuit of Moore and Steele. He got trace of them at Green River, where they or them at Green River, where they were supposed to have stolen other horses. Turner followed his men through Emery county, down through Salina canyon, and into Sanpete county, where he secured their arrest near Fairview a week ago. Turner and his brother officer are now in Manti stopping at the Eagle house, and they ping at the Eagle house, and they are naturally deeply interested in the attempted escape.
