

A MEXICAN POMPEII

Wonderful Ruins of Teotihuacan Being Restored.

Northeast of the City of Mexico, at a distance of 27 miles—an hour's run on the Mexican railway—stand colossal ruins of a prehistoric race and known to the archaeological world as Teotihuacan, "The City of the Gods," says W. W. Black in "Modern Mexico." The great city occupied an area of not less than four square miles. Everywhere within that space the ground is covered with shapeless mounds—when the debris of earth and stone is removed, prove to be the sites of ancient houses or small pyramids. Towering over all, and visible for many miles in any direction, in the center of this fertile vale are the two greatest pyramids in the American continent—the "Sun" and the "Moon." The "Moon" is the smaller of the two, being about 450 feet square at the base and 137 feet high. The "Sun" is a little more than half a mile south of the "Moon," and is about 750 feet square at the base and 137 feet high. Both of these pyramids were in their original state, considerably higher than they are now. The destructive touch of time and the ravaging hand of man have untold in rounding off their sharp contours and given them the appearance at a distance of natural hills.

The Mexican government, under the department of public instruction and the Fine Arts, recently created, has undertaken the restoration of this wonderful "City of the Gods." Hon. Justo Sierra, the worthy head of the department, has placed Don Leopoldo Batres in charge of the work which is to be completed within four years. Senor Batres has been inspector and conservator of public monuments for the past 22 years, and has been successful in carrying to a successful conclusion this

great work. He has 250 laborers under his employ and, although they have been at work but a few weeks, they have already removed 114,000 cubic meters of earth and loose stones to the outskirts of the ruins. To do this they had to build a tramway several hundred yards in length, construct offices, repair shops, storehouses and a comfortable two-story residence for the family of Senor Batres. The government has appropriated \$1,300,000 for the work—and, although it is being done as cheaply as possible—it is probable that \$2,000,000 will be spent before it is brought to a termination.

A small artificial hill near the southwest corner of the "Sun" was first attacked. All the loose earth and stones were carefully removed, and the mound soon resolved itself into a beautiful truncated pyramid with houses on its sides and around it. It has been named by Senor Batres the "House of the Priests," on the supposition that it was the home of the attendants in charge of the great temple that may have originally crowned the summit of the "Sun."

The two great pyramids, at least (and possibly some of the hundreds of smaller ones) were built in layers of coats of earth and volcanic rock. Each layer is a complete pyramid in itself, its outer surface being faced with masonry and then plastered over with a thin coating of cement or lime mortar. Both the "Sun" and the "Moon" show five such layers or pyramids—built like a nest of boxes. Senor Batres has begun to remove the fifth or outer layer, which has become so destroyed by time or man that its shape is hardly discernible. This necessitates the removal of about 1½ yards of earth and stone from the outer surface, but reveals the fourth layer of better pyramid in all its pristine grandeur.

He has finished the south side of the "Sun," and made considerable headway on the north side. The next to be cleared of its debris and vegetation is the west side (facing the "House of the Dead"), and there he will probably find the stairway running from the base to the summit. One of the novelties with hieroglyphics has already been unearthed.

When the writer visited the ruins recently Senor Batres had not decided whether he would next clear away the debris covering the "Moon" or unearth a number of the smaller pyramidal houses. He is proceeding with the work in a very scientific and systematic manner, carefully preserving the fruits of his labors as they steadily move forward towards completion. Wherever frescoes are uncovered, sheds are built over them to protect them from the elements, and photographs are taken from time to time, showing progress of the work. A corps of mounted militia is on guard day and night, and no visitor can approach the reservation without special permission from Senor Batres. This restriction has been found absolutely necessary, and is a very wise provision. When the work of restoration is fully completed, the great ruins of this Mexican Pompeii will be one of the most interesting sights for tourists on the American continent.

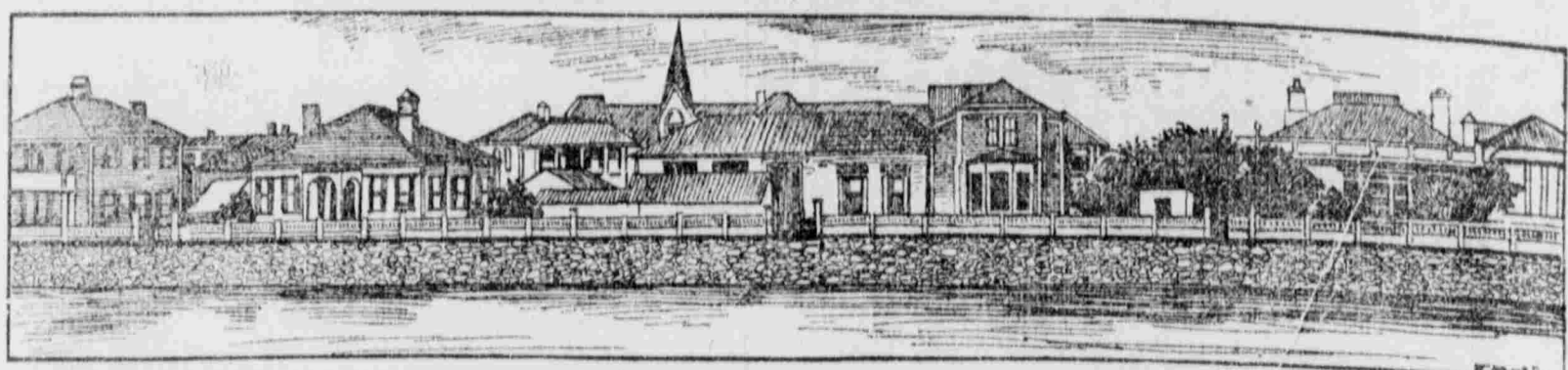
