BICYCLE FAMILY PREPARING TO VISIT RACING CENTERS

Summer in Salt Lake and Scatter All Over Globe in Winter. Which Leads to Some Highly Correct and Gratifying Conclusions.

THE bicycle season drawing towards an end in this city has probably been one of the greatest in bicycling history. No end of records were lowered, some of the marks being lowered every night during a week, at last reaching a point where it was thought they must stand for years. But the very next night often saw seconds clipped off. This was kept up by a spirit of rivalry which grew up among Utah's three world famous saucers, Salt Palace, Saltair Coliseum and Glenwood saucer. Thousands upon thousands of dollars in money prizes and merchandise prizes have gone into the pockets of the riders; and the public have fast, snappy races in exchange for their halves and quarters, and the promoters are putting credit marks in their bank books. So everybody's happy.

The question in a great many circles is not, "Should the tariff be lower?" but "Who's entered in tonight's free-for-all pursuit?" Salt Lake has become the summer headquarters of bicycle racing. You can count the good riders, not riding here, on your finger, and it will not handicap you if you were reckless with firecrackers when a child. This winter the riders who have been seen here all summer will be pulling down the prizes and purses in Vailsburg, New York, Paris, Sydney, Melbourne, and other big centers. Why doesn't Salt Lake have winter racing? It could hold winter racing in the Saltair Coliseum, but other cities—big cities, the biggest in the world—bid high for the riders for a portion of the year. Salt Lake could hardly support the game day in and day out, the year around. Half a year of racing keeps the appetite sharp, anyhow. Here's to the bike boys! They'll all be back with the birds in spring, and they'll be as welcome.

COLORADO'S FOOT BALL PROSPECTS ROSY

H. R. Thompson, writing on Colorado's football prospects for the coming season, for the Denver Post, sizes the situation up in this manner:

"Although it is somewhat early in the season to deal in football dope, it is safe to prophesy even at this time that there will be a struggle this fall on the gridirons of Colorado that will be decidedly worth seeing. At least three schools have eyes on the championship banner and intend to go in to win or die."

"Colorado's team will certainly not lose out on the coaching proposition. Mr. Folsom, who is to have full charge of the coaching, needs no introduction to the football public. 'Bill,' as he is popularly known, is a man who says little but does much. Under his direction a few years ago the Dartmouth eleven, coached by Harvard, crumpled to bits the dust. Mr. Castleman, the director of athletics, will act as assistant coach."

"Many of the old players are scheduled to return to school this fall to battle for their alma mater. It is a great joy to the lovers of the game to learn that 'Heine' Barr, Colorado's giant guard and a member of the All-American eleven, has announced his intention to come back to school and don his uniform once more. Other experienced and formidable warriors who will return are Capt. Clare Coffin, Roy Roberts, Reid, Kimmel, Thomas, Weiner, Randolph, O'Brien, Sterritt, Orner, Stocker, Zimmers, Isenhardt, Colorado eleven, Wilson, Knowles and many others."

"Of the strength of the other teams

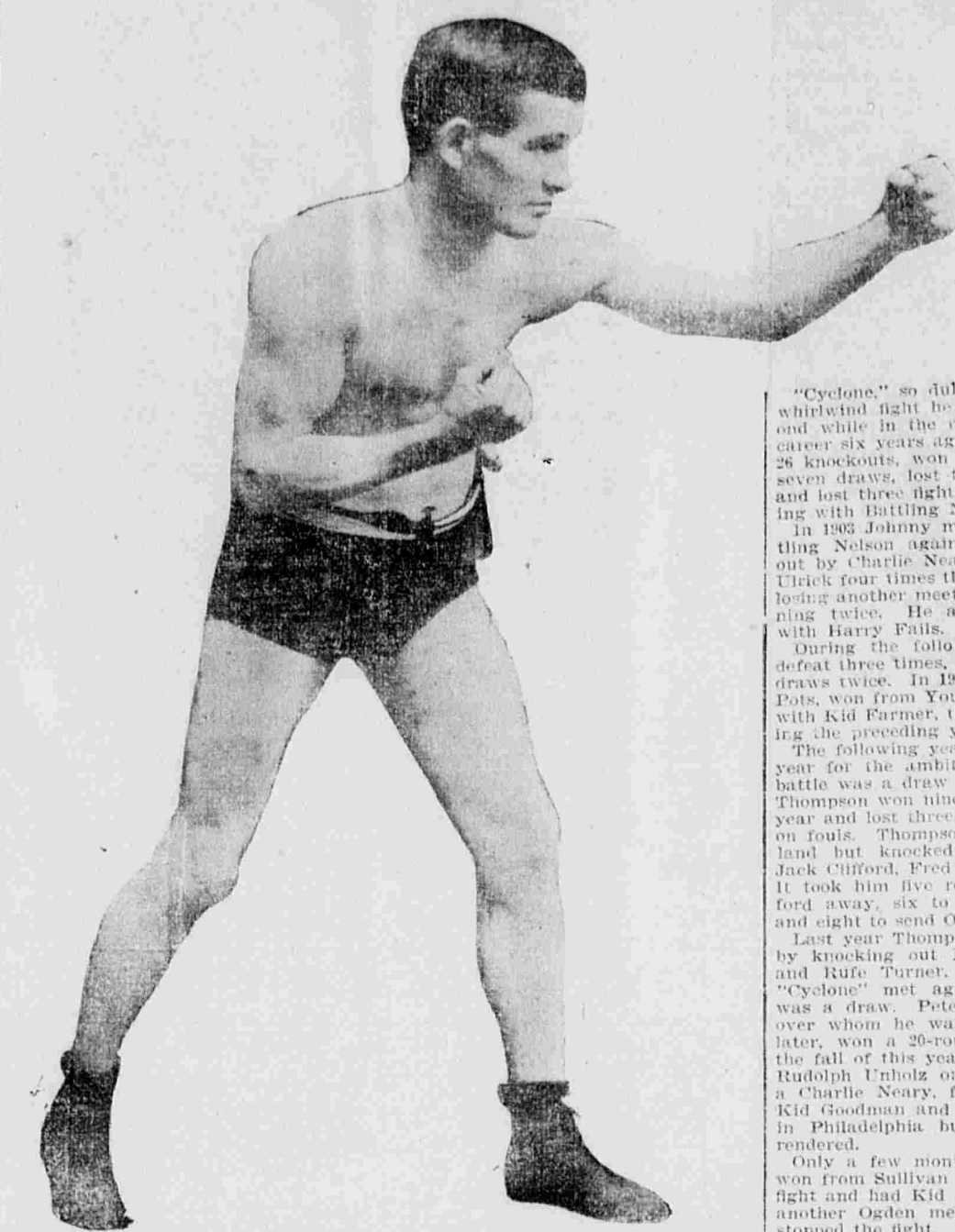
in the state it is impossible to tell. The Miners will lose Coach 'Shorty' Ellsworth, and what Coach Russell will do in the way of a team remains to be seen. Of their old players, the Miners will lose three great stars—Nordenholt, Hoyt and Knowles—whose loss will undoubtedly be felt, even if the school succeeds in getting some good new material. Colorado college is likely to prove a worthy adversary. Former Asst. Coach Richards is to have full sway in the Tiger jungle this season, and his work is something to take into consideration. Report has it, too, that there will be no lack of material in that region when school opens."

Four of these will be with the four state colleges, one with Colorado Springs High school, one with the prep, one with the alumni, and one with Utah will be the only contests held outside the state. In spite of the recent unpleasantness with the latter institution, the Silver and the Golden will most probably go to the Mormon camp."

"The great tussle of the season will, of course, be the Thanksgiving game with the Miners in Denver. Colorado is determined to regain the famous 18 inches which cost her the pennant last year. The Miners will naturally hang on to their laurels at any cost. 'Altogether, the outlook is quite hopeful. At any rate, there will be a fight worth seeing.'"

Johnny "Cyclone" Thompson, Ogden's Adopted Son, After Battling Nelson



WHEN Battling Nelson and Joe Gans meet Labor Day to fight a third battle, Johnny "Cyclone" Thompson of Ogden, Utah, will climb into the ring and challenge the winner of the bout. Johnny seems to feel that Nelson is a sure winner and it is Nelson "Cyclone" is anxious to meet. While in Ogden a few weeks back, Thompson said he

considers himself entitled to meet the battler. "I am fighting in good shape and I do not believe there is any man my weight (132 pounds) who can stay with me for any long battle." Thompson considers himself invincible at 45 rounds or in miles around that length and as long fights are what Nelson likes, the boys are of the same class. Thompson has fought a long list of battles in Ogden, his two most recent victories being those over Pete Sullivan and Kid Dalton.

"Cyclone," so dubbed because of the whirlwind fight he puts up every second while in the ring, began his career six years ago. In 1902 he scored seven draws, won 22 decisions, fought 26 knockouts, lost two battles on fouls and lost three fights, including a meeting with Battling Nelson.

In 1903 Johnny met and lost to Battling Nelson again and was knocked out by Charlie Neary. He met Curley Tinkle four times this year, losing once, losing another meet on a foul and winning twice. He also fought a draw with Harry Fidler. During the following year he met defeat three times, won one and fought draws twice. In 1905 he lost to Jimmy Pats, won from Young Scotty and drew with Kid Farmer, to whom he lost during the preceding year.

The following year (1906) was a busy year for the ambitious boy. His first battle was a draw with Frank Jordan. Thompson won nine battles during this year and lost three, two of these being on fouls. Thompson lost to Dick Hyland but knocked out such men as Jack Clifford, Fred Ward, Otto Seifert. It took him five rounds to knock Cliff away, six to put Ward to sleep and eight to send Otto to dreams.

Last year Thompson opened business by knocking out Maurice Thompson and Lufe Turner. Dick Hyland and "Cyclone" met again and the result was a draw. Pete Sullivan, the man over whom he was victorious a year later, won a 20-round go in 1907. In the fall of this year Johnny won from Rudolph Inholz on a foul, lost again to Charlie Neary, fought a draw with Kid Goodman and met Freddie Welsh in Philadelphia but no decision was rendered.

Only a few months back Thompson won from Sullivan in Ogden in a cruel fight and had Kid Dalton all but in another Ogden meet when a sheriff stopped the fight. Thompson is a tireless fighter and reminds one of Nelson on account of the pair's habit of hammering, hammering, hammering—never stopping to rest, never clinging, hammering from one go to another. A fight between Nelson and Thompson would be a fight from start to finish and the finish could be nothing less than a contest of endurance. It would be two fighters of the bull dog type for it and more scrap would be seen than is usually served up in one mill nowadays.

NEW METHODS PLANNED FOR GOLF TOURNAMENT

country where the "pros" have clashed at hole play have been few and far between, but these affairs have invariably awakened twice the interest of the usually monotonous 72 holes of medal play.

AUTUMN BASEBALL WILL BE HUGE SUCCESS IN UTAH

With Resort Season Ended Crowds Must be Large, Players Are Anxious to Stay, Teams Are Thoroughly Organized And There's Money in the Treasury.

RATHER expected, but none the less welcome, was the announcement made this week that the baseball season in Utah would be continued just as long as the fans wanted to see exhibitions of the national game. This means the baseball season will last until frosty weather comes along, for the fans of this state have had nowhere near a sufficiency of ball for the year. Now that the resorts are closing, bigger crowds than ever are certain to be out at every game. With all four league teams well organized, close, hotly contested games will be served up. The pennant will be given to the leading team. Labor day, as originally planned, all teams will remain intact, for with the season closing in other states, the players will be only too glad to stay on a pay-roll. It is more than likely a majority of the boys who have been playing in this state during the season will stay here over winter. All have good positions in the various towns and so well do they like the state that they announce their determination to stay over for next season. And next season baseball will be conducted under national protection. At least a request is going to be made. Another thing which has made the present season such a success will reign next year. The league will be run on about the same lines as this year's with such new ideas as may be deemed beneficial, added. All this will make the season in baseball one of the smoothest and finest Utah has ever enjoyed.
