

# AN EPISODE AND AN INSTITUTION

New York World Terms President Roosevelt the Former and Declares Itself the Latter.

## IT ISSUES A STATEMENT.

Prosecution Against It Succeeds, Press Will be at Mercy of an Autocratic, Vain-Glorious President.

New York, Feb. 17.—Bowers and Judge of the court for the World, when seen tonight, said they had no comment to make concerning the statement returned at Washington, that the defendants would be entitled to a hearing in this city unless waived examination and decided to go to Washington. In a statement issued tonight, the World says in part:

"This prosecution, if it succeeds, will place every newspaper in Washington at the mercy of an autocrat, vain-glorious president, who is willing to sacrifice the authority of the press for the gratification of his personal malice. For newspapers make large profits. Most of them could be ruined financially by the legal expense of defending themselves from the place of publication and against the tremendous resources of the United States government.

"Under this procedure there is hardly an American newspaper proprietor who would not be liable to criminal indictment in Washington if his newspaper printed something offensive to the president, even though the proprietor might have been the victim of a scheme of a president to add to his place of publication and known nothing whatever about it. There is hardly an editor or writer or reporter who would not be similarly liable in addition to this, all of them would be liable to criminal indictment.

"Mr. Roosevelt is now abusing his great power as president to exploit his political malice. These libel proceedings have no other object than to enable Mr. Roosevelt to employ the machinery of the United States government to satisfy his personal desire for revenge.

"We say this reluctantly, but we say it without qualification, because it is true.

"Mr. Roosevelt is an episode. The World is an institution."

## OLD AGE ANNUITIES.

Senator Hansbrough Introduces Bill Providing for Them.

Washington, Feb. 18.—Senator Hansbrough today introduced a bill providing for a system of old-age annuities to be paid to the aged and infirm. The bill is designed to take the place of the pension for an old age pension for government employees, but extending to all classes. Under it, the government would undertake to receive deposits and to allow a 4 per cent compound interest thereon.

If a person at the age of 20 years deposited 25 cents a week, at the age of 60 years such person would be allowed an annuity of \$129.91. In the case of death of the annuitant prior to reaching 60, the amount deposited, together with the interest would be paid to his or her heirs.

Hansbrough today, "that a person of any age may deposit a lump sum equal to the amount that would have accumulated had such person become a depositor at the age of 20 and receive the annuity at the close of the 60-year period. The minimum annuity is fixed at \$50 and the maximum at \$1200 for any one person, but the head of a household may make old age deposits for the members of the family.

"The advantages in this plan of insurance are first, its complete security, and second, that the government is to give the service without any charge to the beneficiaries."

A policeman, quick to realize the gravity of the situation, climbed up the fire escape and stood on the grating on the floor below the woman and children. Then, in response to his cries, the mother was persuaded to drop the little ones, one after the other, through the opening in the fire escape platform. The little tots landed safely in the policeman's arms, though they are but three months old. The mother was then assisted down.

Washington, Feb. 17.—It developed today at a conference between President-elect Taft, Senators Knox and Hale and Speaker Cannon that these congressional leaders believe that the work of the special session of Congress to be called March 15 can be finished between June 1 and 15. This situation may be changed, however, by the failure of any of the appropriation bills to pass at regular session.

Mr. Taft, it is authoritatively stated, regards the outlook for satisfactory tariff legislation as good.

A copy of the first draft of Mr. Taft's inaugural address has been in the possession of Senator Knox for some time ago, and his suggestions will be sent to Mr. Taft at Cincinnati.

President Roosevelt's approval of the speech is known to have been most hearty.

London, Feb. 17.—The Women's Freedom league held a large meeting in London tonight and adopted resolutions to continue the militant propaganda for suffrage. Mrs. Despard was delegated to carry the resolutions to Premier Asquith tomorrow. 40 members in the audience volunteering to form an escort.

Two suffragettes repeated the tactics employed in the ladies' gallery of the house of commons last night, by chaining themselves to a balustrade in the gallery restaurant tonight in order to interrupt Augustine Birrell, chief secretary of Ireland, who was to speak at a banquet. The women were gagged, however, while Birrell was brought and the chains cut. They were then expelled from the restaurant.

The bill provides against "canned" music for the protection of composers and has been under consideration by a sub-committee for some time past.
